NATION MOURNS PASSING AWAY OF "SUNNY JIM"

FUNERAL CHURCHES WILL CELEBRATE NEXT SATURDAY

President Taft and Other Notables Will Attend—Widow in Process of Final Illness Started

It was announced that the funeral of President Sherman would occur from the First Presbyterian church here at 3 o'clock Saturday afternoon.

UTICA, N. Y., Oct. 31.—Vice President Sherman died at 9:42 last night. The city is in mourning today. The flag is at half mast, and buildings and houses are draped in mourning. A public funeral is being planned. The services will probably be in the First Reformed church, where the vice president worshipped.

It is expected that President Taft and senators and congressmen will attend the funeral.

Physicians say that Sherman sacrificed his life to his party. He disregarded the advice of his physicians and insisted on speaking on the day he was notified of his nomination for the vice presidency. They say that his fatal illness really started then. Later he insisted on venturing out to register.

Political meetings in this city have been abandoned. Democrats have removed the Wilson-Marshall banners and Johnson's progressive speech scheduled here for tonight has been abandoned.

Hundreds of telegrams are arriving, including messages from President Taft, Woodrow Wilson and Colonel Roosevelt.

Mrs. Sherman is prostrated.

BARGAIN PRICES NOW PREVAILING

LUNCHEON COUNTER IN NATIONAL CAPITOL IS CHANGING POPULAR PRICES—WINTER SCALE IN EFFECT

WASHINGTON, D. C., Oct. 31.—"Bargain counter prices" are an innovation at the bon ton restaurant of the Capitol—while crowds of congress are lacking during the legislative recess.

"Why, you can get a ham sandwich now for 10 cents," was the startled exclamation of a Capitol "regular" in commenting on the reduced scale of prices in the cafes of the senate and house.

An investigation shows that the ordinary "winter schedule" of prices for food at the Capitol cafes are cut just in half. Five cents each for coffee, ham sandwiches, milk and cups of pie is now the regular tariff. In the winter the scale is a dime each.

The restaurant concession is given by contract to a caterer by a committee of senators and representatives, with a maximum scale of prices. This maximum is generally in vogue when the senate and the house are in session, but when congress is in recess, but competition of dairy lunches and cheap restaurants during the full recess period is giving Capitol employes a brief enjoyment of cut-rate eating.

Lost Man Found

CHEHALIS, Wash., Oct. 31.—Gordon Sturdevant of Independence, near here, who was lost in the woods while hunting, has been found. He wandered through the mountains and emerged from the woods near Raymond, from which place he was sent home by rail. In the meantime ponies headed by deputies from the sheriff's office were in search of the man in the woods, and these returned last evening. The man was in serious condition when he finally emerged from the woods, after being lost for over five days.

KLAMATH INDIAN IS A CHRISTIAN

JACK PALMER TAKES PAUPER'S OATH AND IS RELEASED FROM PORTLAND JAIL AFTER SERVING THREE MONTHS

"There's a better time a-coming," declared Jack Palmer, Methodist Indian preacher, pointing skyward, when he was taken to jail three months ago, convicted of giving liquor to another redman, says the Portland Telegram. This morning before United States Commissioner Cannon he took the pauper's oath and left for the Klamath reservation, insisting he was a good Methodist.

Palmer swore that his sole property consisted of \$20 passage money to Klamath Falls, two old wagons, two old horses and a wife, who owned two ponies.

When asked whether he was a medicine man as well as a preacher, Palmer laughed and said:

"We are Christian Indians. We don't have medicine men."

The Indian was sentenced to three months' imprisonment and a fine of \$100 for giving liquor to another member of his tribe, but the fine will not be exacted, since he has taken the pauper's oath. There was some doubt at first as to whether he could prove his pauperism. It was thought he owned cattle and horses, but cross-examination by Attorney Maguire failed to establish this.

It is probable that Judge Benson will not be able to return to this city until after election. SNODGRASS IS NOT TO BLAME

McGRAW SAYS THAT HEAVY HITTING OUTFIELDER WILL BE A MEMBER OF THE GIANTS DURING NEXT SEASON

NEW YORK, Oct. 31.—Persistent reports that the National League New York club would dispense with the services of Fred Snodgrass as a result of his costly error in the last world's series game, are set at rest in a statement given out by John McGraw, manager of the defeated club. He says:

"I do not blame Fred Snodgrass in the least for his failure to catch that fly ball in the last game of the world's series at Boston. Snodgrass is a valuable and conscientious player, and he will be a member of the Giants next season. His failure to make the catch is something that would not happen once in a thousand years, and I want to say that he is deserving of sympathy for his failure. It hurts him more keenly than it hurts any one else."

"In this connection I may say that I feel even worse for Mathewson than I do for Snodgrass, as Matty pitched three excellent games without winning any of them. There never was and never will be another pitcher like Matty."

Heart failure, following an embolism of the organ of long standing, was the cause of death. Mrs. McCall was past 76 years of age. The funeral will be held on Wednesday afternoon at 2 o'clock from the McCall home. It will be in charge of Alpha chapter, Order of the Eastern Star, and Burnside Woman's Relief Corps, in both of which organizations the deceased was long a conspicuous and honored worker.

ELECTRIC FANS REPLACE NATIVES

A MODERN AMERICAN SERVICE MERITS WITH FAVOR IN THE ORIENT, AND EASTERN MEN SEEK OTHER VOICES

WASHINGTON, D. C., Oct. 31.—Blasting of high-power American electric fans is displacing the noisy, droning "punkah" in the orient, according to a report received at the state department from Consul General George Anderson of Hongkong. The "punkah," or overhead fan, hung from a ceiling and agitated by coolies pulling it from side to side, is gradually disappearing in the East, Anderson says. American electric ceiling fans are displacing the "punkahs," but there is no demand for the smaller desk fans, so familiar to Americans. Within the last year \$25,000 worth of electric fans were bought in Hongkong.
