The most serious statements and exaggerated reports that have been sent out to make it appear that Klamath Falls should be placed under military rule, but the police judge and the justice of peace report fewer cases than in many months.

What Klamath Falls needs is more get-together spirit and less undesirable publicity in the local papers. It is remarkable what development has taken place in the past year, despite all of the fighting and quarreling. The energy that has been expended on the part of some of the citizens in the endeavor to accomplish the undoing of some fellow citizens, if applied toward the development of Klamath Falls would have made this city the most prosperous in the state. The taxpayers who feel this way are tired of the contention.

Sealed bids marked outside "bid for timber on Klamath Indian Reservation," and addressed to the superintendent of the Klamath Indian School, Klamath Agency, Oregon, will be received until 12 o'clock noon, Pacific coast time, November 30, 1912, for the purchase and removal of all merchantable dead timber, standing or fallen, and all the live timber that may be marked for cutting by the officer in charge on a designated area of about 1,350 acres, located as follows: That part of the SE 1/4 of Section 35 lying east of Williamson River, except that part which is included in an allotment; 2 1/4 of Section 26, T. 22 S., R. 7 E.; SW 1/4 of Section 21, T. 22 S., R. 8 E.; NE 1/4 and that part of NW 1/4 of Section 3 lying east of the river; NW 1/4 of Section 1, T. 24 S., R. 7 E.; NW 1/4 of Section 6, T. 24 S., R. 8 E. Willamette Meridian, estimated to be approximately 10,000,000 feet board measure log scale of yellow pine and a small amount of sugar pine. 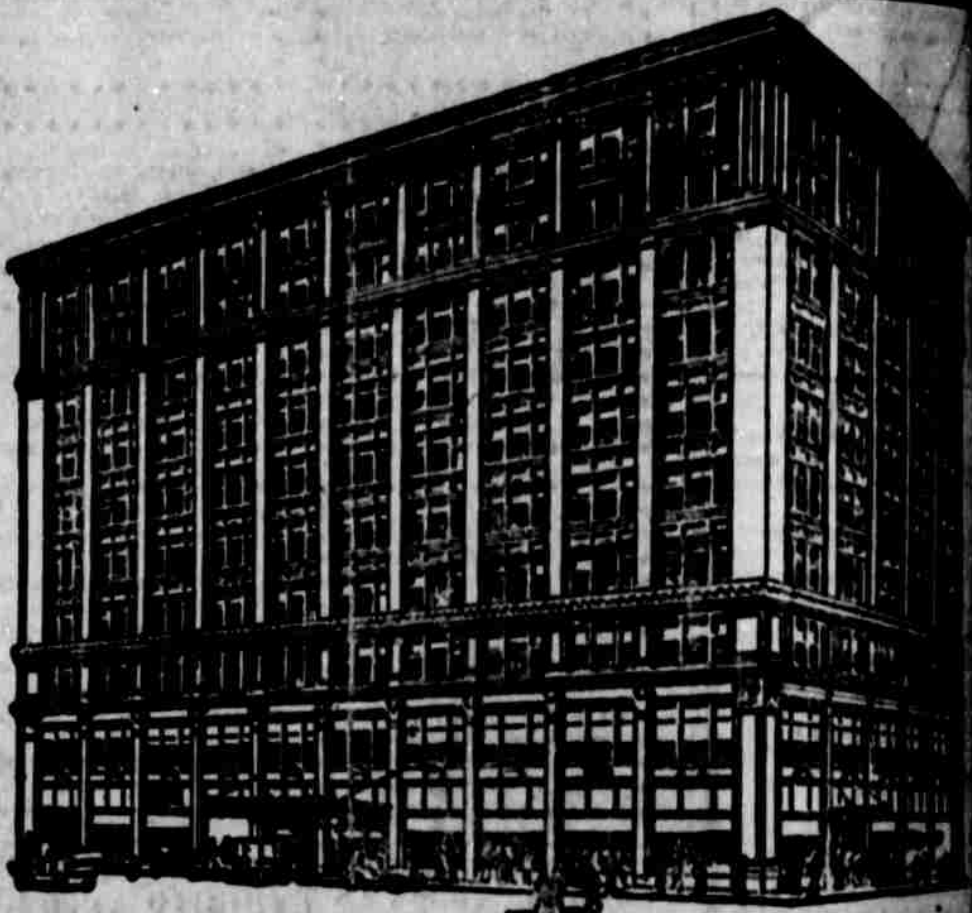

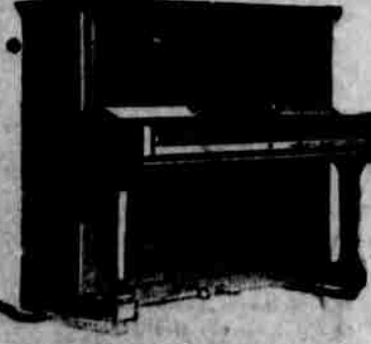
