The progressives take either the first or second place in the balloting, except in five states. In the congressional elections two years from now there will be progressive watchers on the job."

WILSON WINS EAST
Illinois Is Still Battle Ground for Debat

NEW YORK, Nov. 6.—Selected returns show that Wilson will have 399 votes in the electoral college. There is a strong Wilson trend in Illinois, and the democrats are claiming the state. It appears, though, that Teddy has won Illinois, Kansas, Michigan, Pennsylvania and Washington and Taft in Idaho, Utah, Vermont, Wyoming. South Dakota is doubtful.

TAFT CALLS FOR AN ORGANIZATION
PRESIDENT WOULD REORGANIZE REPUBLICAN PARTY—ROOSEVELT WILL ATTEND MEETING OF THE MOORE SOON

NEW YORK, Nov. 6.—The effect of the election on the republican party is now a matter of speculation. The republicans ran second in New York state, so far as the state ticket was concerned, but Roosevelt polled from two to five times as many votes as Taft.

Wilson Plans to Make Things Easy for the Next Four Years
President Elect Tells Citizens of his Plans, Ideals and Other Things Before Taking the Presidential Chair. Says He Wants a Chance to Talk to the Nations

PRINCETON, Nov. 6.—Woodrow Wilson issued the following statement this morning:

"The result gives hope that the thoughtful voters of the nation may now unite to give the country freedom and enterprise. The government has been released from selfish and arrogant influences, and will now be devoted to justice and progress. There is nothing for the enlightened business man to fear. Our hope and our purpose is to bring all free forces of the nation into active, intelligent co-operation to give our prosperity a spirit of confidence such as has never before occurred.

"My own ambition will be satisfied if I be permitted frank spokesmanship of the nation on matters of great thought."

PRESIDENT ELECT WILL NOT BE SEEN AS GOVERNOR FOR SEVERAL MONTHS—WANTS TO MAKE IMPROVEMENTS

PRINCETON, Nov. 6.—Woodrow Wilson had no plans for going to Oregon to inaugurate his term as president. He is expected to visit his state.

The president-elect announced that he had made no immediate plans, but believed that he would go to Oregon in the spring. He would not visit the state until the inauguration of New Jersey until the inauguration. He gave no definite date for his departure to take possession of the presidential office at the next legislature, together with special sessions.

Secretary of State—William Jennings Bryan.
Secretary of Agriculture—Dr. Wiley.
Attorney General—Louis Brandies.
Secretary of Navy or Interior—Burleson of Texas.
Postmaster General—William McAdoo or Jos. Daniels.
Secretary of Treasurer—Redfield of New York.
Chairman McCombs of the national committee is not likely to be a member of the cabinet, but will be taken care of otherwise. His health is poor.

Tom Pence, Wilson's publicity man, will probably be the president's private secretary.

Moosers Hang Tight to the Oregon Vote
Roosevelt Followers Still Claim they Have a Chance to Put this State in Column of Progressives

PORTLAND, Nov. 6.—At Democratic headquarters here it is predicted that Wilson will carry the state by 5,000 plurality. Lane is picked as the winner in the senatorial fight, although the result is doubtful up to a late hour this afternoon.

Incomplete returns from twenty counties favor Wilson, although this does not guarantee him the state. At present polling is the strongest senatorial candidate. It is not supposed that the outcome of either the presidential or senatorial issue will be known before midnight, and it is possible not until tomorrow.

Up to noon, 26 precincts in Portland and Multnomah county were complete. Partial returns from 27 others in Portland, totaling 75, were as follows: Wilson 2,000, Roosevelt 2,500, Taft 2,000.

In the 27 precincts in which the count is completed Taft polls a comparatively large vote. In some towns precincts the vote will not be counted before tomorrow night.

Ballots in running behind in Portland, but the 27 precincts, including Multnomah, Washington, Clatsop, Clackamas, Hood River, Jackson, Harrow, Tillamook, Union and Washington (27) 5,425 votes for suffrage to 6,125 against. If the vote hangs up the Portland majority against suffrage will be wiped out, and the moosers will pass.

Sam Gillis leads Jonathan Stewart by 620 votes, according to returns from 26 precincts in Multnomah county. Thurston still remains in the state give Gillis 2,200, Stewart 1,580 and Lane 4,700. It is believed that 1,200 votes were cast in Multnomah county and Multnomah county.
