HAYDON MAY BE LOW'S DEPUTY

SHERIFF-ELECT DENIES THAT HE HAS MADE ANY PROMISES OF JOBS, AND SAYS HE HAS MADE NO APPOINTMENTS

Sheriff-elect C. C. Low denied a rumor this morning that he had selected his deputies. He admitted, however, that he was considering the appointment of George Haydon, at present Sheriff Barnes' chief deputy. "Mr. Haydon is thoroughly familiar with the work in the office," said Mr. Low, "and while it is possible that I will offer him the place, I have not yet done so."

John Schallack, who was defeated for constable, may be retained by the county court as jailor in the county jail, although this has not been definitely decided.

Lane Leads Ben Selling in the Senatorial Race

Incomplete Returns from Oregon Indicate that the Democratic Candidate will Succeed Bourne

PORTLAND, Nov. 7.—Returns of nearly half of the vote of the state give Lane a plurality of 999 votes over Selling. This seems to assure his election. Bourne is 9,788 votes behind.
Complete returns from 27 precincts in Multnomah county and incomplete figures from nearly 20 outside counties at noon today stood as follows:
Lane 17,995, Selling 16,996, and Bourne 13,887.
In the outside counties Selling is strong. Outside of Multnomah county the latest figures obtainable give him a lead of 296 votes over Lane, with a total of 16,116, and 8,893 for Lane. Bourne ran away behind outside of Multnomah, polling 6,890 for Lane's 9,833 and Selling 16,116. Clark, progressive, totals 8,399 votes.

BRYAN SILENT

BULGARIANS ARE KILLED IN RUSSIA

REPORTS FROM SERBIA SAY THAT THE MASSACRE OF SERB CHRISTIANS IN AREA BEING SO IMMINENT

Republicans Will Be Members of Country's Third Party

Political Machinery Passes to the Progressives Because of the Stinging Defeat Administered Tuesday. Wilson's Strength is Growing Hourly

NEW YORK, Nov. 7.—Woodrow Wilson will have at least 439 electoral votes, according to the latest compilation, and he may add Wyoming's three votes on the official count.
Roosevelt is second, with Pennsylvania, South Dakota, Washington and Minnesota, a total of 77.

Taft gets Idaho, Utah and Vermont, a total of 15.
Roosevelt lost Illinois and Kansas, but gained Minnesota through the farmers vote.
Wilson will not receive a popular majority, but his plurality exceeds two and a half millions. The exact figures are not available.

The socialists lost Berger, but their leaders claim that the party polled over 800,000 votes.
Stubbs was defeated in Kansas for senator.
Roosevelt was second in many of the states, and thus gives the progressive control of the election machinery.

Debs Declares Administration is Certain to be a Flat Failure

Socialist Leader Says that Wilson is Face to Face With a Situation Beyond the Power of any Mortal to Control. He Predicts that a Panic is Certain

TERRA HAUTE, Nov. 7.—Eugene V. Debs in a statement issued today said:
"The democrats will be completely in control of the government after

March 4. There can be no dodging of responsibility. That the administration will be a flat failure goes without saying.
"If a radical revision of legislation in the interests of the working class

is attempted the big interests will precipitate a panic, paralyzing the country and discrediting the democracy. Wilson is face to face with a situation utterly beyond the power of any mortal to control."

Race for County Job is Reported to be Close

Manning and Daggett Poll Nearly Equal Number of Votes, but it is Believed that Daggett Wins

The race between Daggett and Manning for the office of county treasurer, with but one precinct not certain, shows Daggett in the lead with but 23 votes to spare. The doubtful precinct in Dairy, where Manning is credited with having received a majority of 88.
