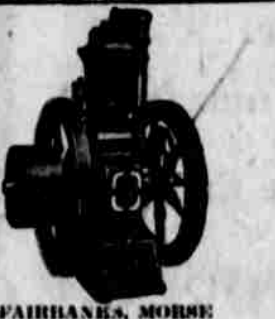

COMPLAINT IS MADE BECAUSE

LIGHTWEIGHT BOXER IS NOW
MORE CONFIDENT THAN EVER

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 7.—Willie
Ritchie, San Francisco's contender for
honors in the lightweight division, is
more convinced than ever that he is
