

California and Idaho are Still in the Doubtful Column Lane Wins Over Selling by Thousand or More Votes

DEMOCRAT HAS LEAD IN RACE FOR U. S. SENATE

BOURNE IS STRENGTHENING, BUT IS OUT OF RACE

Selling Runs Well in His Own County. But Lane Gets Most Votes in the Outlying Sections—With Half of State Heard From, the Democrat Has a Lead Which Will Probably Carry Him Through

PORTLAND, Nov. 8.—The latest returns from throughout the state indicate that Lane has won in the senatorial race over Selling. At a late hour this afternoon the vote was Lane 35,073, Selling 34,322, Bourne 24,456. Lane is leading Bourne in Multnomah county by 651. Lane is leading Selling in Multnomah county by 799, with all but two precincts heard from. More than half of the vote of the state has been accounted for. Lane is ahead by 731. Selling is cutting down Lane's state-wide lead, but it is not (Continued on page 4)

CALIFORNIA IS STILL IN DOUBT

LATEST RETURNS SHOW THAT ROOSEVELT HAS A SLIGHT LEAD, BUT NORTHERN PRECINCTS ARE MISSING
SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 8.—California is still in doubt. The latest available figures give Roosevelt 250,255 and Wilson 250,125. The latest returns from Los Angeles county with three precincts missing give Roosevelt 75,489 and Wilson 54,324. There are a few precincts in the northern counties which are missing, and the outcome is considered most doubtful.

CALIFORNIA VOTE MAY BE DIVIDED

SHAYING OF PROGRESSIVE ELECTORS MAY RESULT IN DIVISION OF VOTES BETWEEN TREDDY AND WILSON

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 8.—With about 50 precincts missing, it is now admitted that an official count will be necessary to decide the result in this state. Roosevelt leads by about 200. Los Angeles county, with seven precincts missing, gives the progressives a plurality of 30,279, which, it is believed will be enough to swing the state for Roosevelt by a slight plurality. Possibly on account of the cutting of some of the progressive electors in the south, the electoral vote of the state will be divided.

FINANCES ARE IN GOOD SHAPE

COMPTROLLER OF PANAMA-PACIFIC EXPOSITION MAKES PUBLIC THE RECEIPT AND DISBURSEMENT OF FUNDS

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 8.—Rodney S. Durkee, comptroller of the Panama-Pacific International Exposition, in his statement of the income, expenditures and subscription account for the entire period from the commencement of business in December, 1909, to September 30, 1913, states that \$295,166.62 was used for the purchase of real estate, and that the building and grounds department has expended \$240,542.33, which is an indication of its activity. This outlay covers architectural and engineering expenses and the cost of filling in the overflow lands on the exposition site. The subscription accounts show total signed subscriptions of \$6,095,350, and unsigned subscriptions of \$1,453,250, making a total of \$7,548,600. "Of the unsigned subscriptions," says Comptroller Durkee, "there has been paid \$2,295,801.29, or 30.16 per cent of the total. Inasmuch as but 40 per cent of the total has been called for at the time of this statement, I consider the proportion of collections very remarkable."

CONSTANTINOPLE CERTAIN TO BE IN ALLIES' HANDS

LAST LINE OF DEFENSE BELONGS TO ENEMY

Members of the Committee in the City and in Constantinople of the Bulgarians are Substantially—Suggest That Although the Bulgarians Cannot Be Confirmed—Fighting Is in Progress

VIENNA, Nov. 8.—Lombard by our telegrams that Bulgarian negotiations have been opened for the transfer of the Turkish empire to the allies. He adds that the Bulgarian operations are progressing satisfactorily.

LONDON, Nov. 8.—Lombard by our telegrams that the Bulgarians have captured most of the north facing Constantinople line of defense. Further fighting is progressing and Constantinople's speedy fall is certain. A cessation of fighting will probably follow.

The statement that Athens has surrendered cannot be verified. Reports from Athens indicate that the Greeks have captured Salonika. This cannot be confirmed.

U. S. VESSELS TO GUARD CITIZENS

PRESIDENT TAFT ORDERED TWO ARMORED CRUISERS TO SAIL FOR SMYRNA AT ONCE—SOMEONE IN DANGER

WASHINGTON, D. C., Nov. 8.—President Taft has ordered the armored cruisers Montana and Tennessee to sail immediately from Philadelphia to protect American missionaries and educators in Smyrna and Beirut.

The president has ordered the American ambassador at Constantinople to prepare to protect Americans in that city.

Smile Will Take the Place of Hand Cuffs

Miss Elsie Low will be Appointed Deputy Sheriff. She will Wear a Star and Make Arrests

Klamath county is to have a young woman deputy sheriff. Miss Elsie, daughter of Sheriff-elect Low, is to be provided with a star, and will perform the duties of deputy sheriff after January 1, when her father takes his office. Miss Low is one of the most attractive young women in the county, and the only objection that can be advanced to her appointment is that it may result in the young men of the county courting arrest. Anyway, it is certain that when Deputy Sheriff Elsie Low goes out to make an arrest there will be no resistance. Miss Low's principal work in connection with the sheriff's office will be, of course, clerical. She will assist in the collection of taxes, but there is certain to come a time when the masculine deputies are not available, and a hurry call for an officer will come in. Then, with her star conspicuously displayed, she will be expected to go forth and perform the duties of the office. "Come with me," Miss Low's friends know the persuasive smile which will accompany this command, and they are certain that there will be no hanging back. No handcuffs, twisters, or other adjuncts to the job of peace officer will be necessary. "Yes, Miss," and the person who has disturbed the peace and dignity of the community will trot right along to the county jail.

Bad Checks Cause a Young Man to Flee

R. W. Caldwell is Being Sought by the Officers of the Law. It is Said that he Issued Bad Paper

R. W. Caldwell, a young man who has been in the city several weeks, is being sought by the officers on a charge of securing money by means of worthless checks. As a result of his operations two Klamath Falls places of business are out \$10 each. Complaint against Caldwell was sworn to this afternoon by J. L. Parrish, a bartender, employed at the

"Smoke" saloon. It is charged that Caldwell issued a check for \$10, signing his own name, and drawn on the First National bank. He had no funds there, it is charged. It is reported that another local business house also holds some of Caldwell's paper, although no complaint has been made. Caldwell is believed to have gone to California.

Austria and Russia Get Ready for Hard European Campaign

Troops are Massed on the Frontiers and it is Believed that the end of War with Turkey will be Marked by the Commencement of a Great War

PARIS, Nov. 8.—Austria has massed a large force on the frontier, and everything is in readiness to invade the territory of the Balkan states if this becomes necessary in order to enforce territorial demands. Russia is practically on a war footing.

Big War Near
BUDAPEST, Nov. 8.—It is reported that the Bulgarians have completely reduced Chatala fortifications and the routed defenders are marching toward Constantinople, twenty-five miles distant. It is believed that this is the end of the struggle between the allies and Turkey, but near the beginning of a greater European war.

BELGRADE, Nov. 8.—Serbian statements say that they do not intend to be checked out of the parts of Durazzo, Sanghewon and Montenegro and Albania, which was the possession of Serbia in 1914. It is announced that Austria Italy will likely divide the Balkan region of Europe.
