COURT WILL HEAR CHARGES AGAINST SOUTHERN MOOSE

WRIT OF MANDAMUS IS GRANTED
IN LOS ANGELES

Democrats Do Not Want Thirty Provisions in Southern County Counted. Claim is Made That There Was Fraud—Late Count Gives Roosevelt a Lead of Ten Votes in Entire State of California

LOS ANGELES, Nov. 14.—The district court of appeals has granted the democrats an alternative writ of mandamus against the county board of supervisors to show cause why thirty precincts, all strong for Roosevelt, and disputed by the democrats, should be counted. The case will be argued Monday.

SACRAMENTO, Nov. 14.—The returns tabulated in Governor Johnson's office this afternoon showed that Roosevelt was 200 votes ahead of Wilson. These returns include the unofficial returns from several counties. The totals are: Roosevelt 223,017, Wilson 222,821.

Charged with shooting at H. Rabbe, W. A. Leonard and L. W. Brown. L. A. Davidson was arrested by Sheriff H. H. Cotton this afternoon. The offense, it is alleged, was committed last Tuesday, and the specific charge is assault with a dangerous weapon. Davidson is a well known rancher residing near Midland. He heard that there was a warrant for his arrest, and came to this city this afternoon, accompanied by his wife and daughter. According to the story told by Mr. Davidson, he had warned Rabbes, Brown and Leonard not to hunt on his property, but they refused to obey his warning. WAR NEARS END; POWERS WILL NOT MIX IN FIGHTING

UNOFFICIAL REPORTS POINT
TOWARD PEACE

Bulgarians Will Probably Agree to
the Plan Which Has Been Adopted
by the Great Nations—Albanians
Complain That the Servians Are
Worse Than the Turks When It
Comes to Hostility

PARIS, Nov. 14.—It is semi-officially stated that the powers have agreed to a policy concerning the future developments in the Balkans. It has been arranged so that the powers will not clash, no matter what the allies may do.

SOFIA, Nov. 14.—The cabinet met tonight to consider the note of the powers, presented by the ministers to Premier Guchoff, wherein Bulgaria was notified that Turkey requested a cessation of hostilities during peace negotiations. The Bulgarian reply is expected to be favorable toward the ending of the war.

NEWELL APPROVES STATE LAND BOOK

DIRECTOR OF THE RECLAMATION
SERVICE WRITING FROM THIS
CITY TELLS OF BENEFIT OF
RECENT PUBLICATION

Frederick H. Newell, director of the reclamation service, believes that the book about to be issued by the state board of immigration and containing exact information about Oregon conditions, will materially help the campaign for better farms, better markets and uninfested values. He has written from Klamath Falls to the secretary of the state board of immigration as follows: "When at Corvallis my attention was called to the preliminary agricultural survey being carried on by your organization in co-operation with Professor Beall. I have looked over some of the returns, and am very much interested in them, as they form the basis of more complete knowledge of the conditions which prevail on the farms. "We must have substantial facts of this kind to undo the evil results which have come from unwise advertising. It seems to me that this will go far in that direction."

In a letter written to Prof. J. A. Beall, chief of the O. A. C. statistical bureau, Director Newell announces that he has found it necessary to shorten his tour and return to Washington. He asks for definite facts relative to irrigated areas.

Governor West Is Not Well Quoted

Letter Made Public is Not as it was Written by the State Executive. Officials in City Get Copies

city and county officials here. Copies of a few days ago Governor West gave out a portion of a letter addressed to the officers charged with the enforcement of the law.

A copy follows. The portion printed in black was not given publicly by the governor: "Gentlemen—This office has made a careful investigation as to the moral conditions and alleged lack of law enforcement in the city of Klamath Falls, and begs leave to offer the following suggestions: We find that past conditions have been such as to give the good people of that city just cause for complaint. To air these conditions at this time, however, would serve no useful purpose, as far as the work of this office is concerned, and might lead the city of Klamath Falls receiving much undesired, unpleasant notoriety. We will, therefore, let the past take care of itself and devote our attention to the present and future.

This office is, as you are no doubt aware, charged with the enforcement of the law. It is advised that the laws of this state covering gambling, bow-dy houses and the sale of liquor have been and are now being violated in such a manner as to have caused a great change

within this last week or ten days, and that this fact has been known to the officers charged with the enforcement of the law. We are advised that certain of said officers justify their action in not enforcing the law by saying that public opinion favored their course. I wish to say in this connection that it is the duty of such public officials to interpret and enforce public opinion. We have in this state statutes which would suppress cattle rustlers and box rustlers. It is, therefore, the duty of public officers charged with the law to bring about their apprehension and conviction. These officers have no right to send to the prison the honest thief and leave at home the pimp, simply because some of their political supporters or patrons favor the latter and not the former. My contention is that the cattle rustler is a gentleman of a high order as compared with the box rustler, and wherever there might be an occasion for a discrimination this office would feel more justified in deciding in favor of the former.

The Klamath county grand jury will probably be called to meet next Monday. Judge Benson will arrive in the city tomorrow night, and immediately after a consultation with Prosecuting Attorney Krynhamer, it is probable that the grand jury will be summoned. The principal work of the inquisitorial body at this session will be the investigation of charges of criminal libel, according to authentic information.

Since the interference in the office of Klamath Falls by Governor West, there have been many charges made on the streets, and it is the determination of the county officials to sift them before the grand jury. The principal cases will be those against Sam Evans, alleged publisher of the Northwestern, and Governor West.

The charges against the governor are said to be sensational. The recent interview given out by the governor regarding the conditions alleged to exist in this city will form the basis of the charges. It is claimed that, although he has received letters from here in defense of the charges made, he has not given them publicity, although he has given every bit of available information against the good reputation of this city all publicity.
