DENIES MAKING BOURNE PACT

REPUBLICAN NATIONAL COMMIT-
TEEMAN SAYS THAT HE HAD
NOT PLANNED TO CAUSE ALL
FEDERAL SNAPS TO BE FILLED

PORTLAND, Nov. 14.—Ralph E.
Williams, Republican national com-
mitteeman and official adviser of the
administration in regard to "federal
pact" in Oregon, has denied that he
has conferred with Senator Bourne
with a view to filling up the vacant
spots in Oregon before Wilson is in-
augurated as president.

"I have never talked with Senator
Bourne on a political subject in my
life," he said.

It is clear that if any negotiations
are being carried on it is by inter-
mediation of friends of the two gen-
erals. The basis for such an agree-
ment would be the rule to give and
take, Williams permitting Bourne to
name certain officers in return for
like concessions by Bourne.

John W. Ferguson, secretary of
the democratic state committee and
state insurance commissioner, is be-
ing discussed as a possible applicant
for the position of postmaster. This
is really the pick of all the Oregon
appointments, with a salary of \$5,000
a year.

HAWLEY MAY GO TO U. S. SENATE

GOVERNOR OF IDAHO IS URGED
TO RESIGN HIS OFFICE TO BE
APPOINTED BY HIS SUCCESSOR
TO CONGRESS

BOISE, Idaho, Nov. 14.—If he
heeds the counsel of his friends, Gov-
ernor Hawley of Idaho will himself
take the position of United States
senator made vacant by the death of
the late Senator Hayden. The leading
democrats, it is said, have been un-
able to unite upon a man pending the
meeting of the republican legislature
and Hawley has been urged to resign
the governorship and accept the ap-
pointment at the hands of Lieuten-
ant Governor Sweetser, who would
succeed to the executive chair.

PIONEER WOMAN WILL HELP WEST

MRS. ABIGAIL DUNIWAY WILL
WRITE THE PROCLAMATION
WHICH WILL GIVE WOMEN THE
RIGHT TO VOTE IN OREGON

SALEM, Nov. 14.—Upon Mrs. Abi-
gail Scott Duniway, the pioneer su-
frage leader in the state, is to be con-
ferred the distinction of drafting, in
her own handwriting, the proclama-
tion declaring the woman suffrage
amendment to be in effect, for Gov-
ernor West has announced that when
the time comes to issue the proclama-
tion, he will go to Portland and have
Mrs. Duniway write it, when he
will sign it and file it in her own
handwriting in the state's archives.

The law provides that within thirty
days after the election the secretary
of state shall canvass the vote on the
measures, and that the governor shall
issue a proclamation declaring them
to be in effect. While the courts have
ruled that initiative and referendum
measures go into effect as soon as a
majority vote is cast in their favor,
and a proclamation is not necessary,
the governor intends to hurry the
proclamation on woman's suffrage, so
as to leave no question as to their
right to participate in a number of
city elections to be held in the state
this fall.

Woodrow Wilson as Lexicographer

The American public speaker is not
"heckled" by an audience as is his
British cousin on the other side of the
Atlantic, but the unexpected question
is occasionally to be reckoned with.
At such a moment ready wit is all
that can save the day. Personal in-
tegrity, intellectual attainments and
a righteous cause avail little or noth-
ing.

President-elect Wilson is a past
master of repartee, as he proved a
score of times during his recent
"stumping" tour, though never more
effectively than in the South Jersey
hamlet of Sea Isle. He had just re-
ferred to himself as "a political opti-
mist," when someone called out, "and
what's that?"

Instantly came the answer: "A
political optimist, my friend, is a fel-
low who can make sweet pink lemon-
ade out of the bitter yellow fruit
which his opponents hand him."
On election day Sea Isle went
strong for Wilson.—Lippincott's.

SON RESPONSIBLE FOR DAD'S ACTS

SUPREME COURT WILL HOLD
YOUNG MAN IN CONTEMPT IF
HIS FATHER CONTINUES TO
USE ABUSIVE LANGUAGE

OLYMPIA, Wash., Nov. 17.—If an
elderly resident of North Fork, Ore.,
uses insulting language to his former
daughter-in-law, his son, Robert D.
Bedlife of Tacoma will be cited for
contempt of court, according to a de-
cree of the state supreme court, just
rendered. Bedlife secured a divorce
from his wife some time ago at Ta-
coma. The original decree awarded
the children to the father, but pro-
vided that the mother might visit
them. Bedlife sent the children to
the home of his parents at North
Fork, and when the mother called to
see them she was greeted by unprint-
able insults from the children's grand
father. She applied to the Pierce
county superior court to modify the
decree so that the children be brought
back to this state. This was denied,
and that denial is affirmed by the
supreme court on the grounds that
the children are being well cared for
where they are. But the decree says
that the mother must be permitted to
see the children without being in-
sulted, and that her former husband
will be held for contempt if this order
is not obeyed, and the court will
again take up the custody of the
children.
