#### EUROPEAN WAR IS AVERTED BY AGREEMENT

##### BULGARIA CLOSES DEFINITE PACT WITH AUSTRIA

Paris 14 to Get Adriatic Seaport and Railroad From Mitrovitza to Salonika, According to Statement Made by President Danoff of the Bulgarian Parliament—Chobura Adds to Honors of War

LONDON, Nov. 15.—It is authoritatively stated that President Danoff of the Bulgarian parliament has closed a definite agreement with Austria, whereby Serbia gets an Adriatic seaport and the railroad from Mitrovitza to Salonika. This practically kills any chance of European war.

LONDON, Nov. 15.—Turkey and Bulgaria have definitely agreed to an armistice, according to a Central News Agency message received here from Sofia, via Bucharest. This report cannot be confirmed.

Bulgaria Wants Constantinople

CONSTANTINOPLE, Nov. 15.—The ambassadors of the Powers have told the Porte that they will have to consult the other allies, as Bulgaria does not grant an armistice. This is interpreted as indicating that Bulgaria is determined to occupy Constantinople.

Bulgarians Continue to Advance

BUDAPEST, Nov. 15.—The Bulgarians continue to advance, regardless of the peace negotiations in progress. It is reported that the vanguard has reached Kiliya, the Black Sea entrance to the Bosphorus, with the main force within Chatalja, and the lines still advancing. The occupation of Constantinople is believed to be inevitable, as the Ottomans are putting up a very weak defense.

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#### BUD ANDERSON IS HERE FOR MILL

VANCOUVER LAD FEELS GOOD AFTER A HARD BATTLE WITH GEORGE MEMSICK, FAMOUS LOS ANGELES LIGHTWEIGHT

Bud Anderson, without a scratch, in spite of his encounter in Medford Tuesday night with George Memstick, one of the best known lightweights in the country, arrived in the city last night to prepare for his bout with "Australia" Kelley here a week from tonight.

Dick Donald, Anderson's manager, declares that his boy is in great shape and that the mill here next week will be a good one.

"I don't think there is a chance in the world of Bud losing," said Donald this afternoon, "but this Kelley boy must be watched. He knows a lot about the game, and is a comer. We will look out for him."

Anderson will go into training at once, although he is in perfect condition right now. He has agreed to make 123 pounds on the afternoon of the mill.

The Portland Journal had the following to say about the Memstick-Anderson go:

"Hoping to make a rich harvest of easy money, George Memstick of Los Angeles, under the assumed name of Freddie Corbett, and a following, invaded Medford to fight ten rounds with Bud Anderson of Vancouver, Wash. Anderson won in the eighth round on a knockout, after flooring Memstick eight times. After the first two rounds the fight was all Anderson's, Memstick vainly hoping to land a lucky knockout. As the bout turned out, Anderson's claim to recognition with the near topnotchers is strengthened. The loser admitted his identity and warmly praised the Vancouver lad as a comer of the first quality.

It was the twenty-second scalp Anderson tied to his belt. The pseudo Corbett boxed like a veteran, and floored Anderson in the second round, but the Vancouver boy rose like a feak and from then until the eighth sent his opponent to the mat at least once in every round.

He swore that Jim McNamara declared that he had placed the dynamite charge at the Otis home.

#### ELECTION MIX-UP GETTING WORSE

#### OIL REPLACING WOOD FOR FUEL

TWO OWNERS OF BUILDINGS IN KLAMATH FALLS FIND CHEAPER METHOD OF HEATING THAN WITH WOOD

Klamath Falls now has two buildings being heated by furnaces using oil for fuel, and the indications are that this will be the coming fuel for city in all of the large buildings. The new G. W. White building has been equipped with an oil burner, and J. A. Foster of the Fox System, has just completed the installation of a plant in the Loomis building which in addition will also furnish heat for the First National Bank building.

These two plants are now in operation, and interested owners of buildings are watching the experiment with interest, as on their success will depend the discarding of the wood furnaces for the oil burner. With the oil burner the cost and trouble of operating is reduced to a minimum, and it is stated that the cost of fuel, even with the present high freight rate, only amounts to about one-half of that where wood is used.

It is quite probable that the county high school and city schools and other public buildings will eventually adopt oil for fuel, and all of the new buildings to be erected in Klamath Falls will probably be equipped with oil burners, if the claims of the manufacturers are proven.

KRUTSCHNITZ FEELS WEST IN FINE SHAPE

NEW YORK, Nov. 15.—"Business is big throughout our territory." This is the announcement of Julius Krutchnitz, vice president of the Hawaiian lines, here today after a six weeks' trip over the company's property inspecting Pacific Coast territory.

Concerning reports that the Southern Pacific intended running the proposed new short line between Portland and Los Angeles, Krutchnitz declared the work was being pushed to serve local territory, but the prospects for a through line were still far distant.

#### WILLIAM CARLEY FACES CHARGE OF ROBBING A STORE

WITH NEIGHBORS AND BROTHER, WHO YOUTH ATTEMPTED ROBBERY

Attempt to Rob Local Gun Store Is Frustrated by Vigilance of Police

Plunder Is Suspected, and Police Is Now Looking for an Alleged Accomplice—Fugitive Is Well Known in This City.

Caught in the very act of robbing Chamber's Gun Store in this city last night, William Carley is a prisoner in the county jail, and the police are now searching for a young man believed to have been his accomplice. Credit for the capture is given to Officer William Hall of the local police force.

Carley says that he is 19 years of age, but he looks older. He has not been subjected to a very close examination by the officers, but it is believed that he will tell about every petty robbery which has been committed in this city during the past two months.

When the youth threw up his hands in response to a demand from Officer Hall he had in his possession about \$21 in nickels and dimes, taken from the cash register in the gun store.

About 1 o'clock last night Officer Hall was walking along South street when he was attracted by an unusual noise. As that he supposed that some one in the vicinity was engaged late at night in his place of business, he upon walking around on South street his suspicions were aroused by a young man who was standing about in front of the gun store.

The officer advanced rapidly, the young man ran to the front of the gun store, jumped on the window, and then hurried away. Officer Hall ran to the window, looked in and saw some one inside. The officer made an effort to break in, but, fearing that the burglar had taken flight, he hurried around to the back. There

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## Movement Started to Create New Office for the County

### Attorneys are Anxious to Have Clerk of the Circuit Court to handle Matters Connected With Suits, Now Performed by County Clerks

A movement has been started by members of the bar and the county clerk's office for the creation of the office of clerk of the circuit court for Klamath county. At the present time the county clerk is ex-officio clerk of the circuit court, and the work is performed by himself or by some of the deputies in his office.

When court is in session there is a mass of work for this department, and where a portion of the records are kept in the circuit court and the balance in the county clerk's office, it causes a great inconvenience to the attorneys as well as the clerk, and it is very easy for errors to occur.

Since January 1st there has been 81 law cases filed and 82 equity cases,

and there are now 69 law cases pending and 60 equity cases, besides the criminal cases and naturalization matters. All of these cases have to be docketed and the papers and orders filed as they are presented by the attorneys and the court. Unless extreme care is taken it is easy for mistakes to be made in the entries and filing of the papers. This is particularly true should the papers be filed with one of the deputies unfamiliar with the work, during the session of court.

Executions are issued and sometimes not entered in the execution docket by deputies not having that work in charge, and thereby causes considerable annoyance to the attorney. When cases are filed by a deputy

that is not used to the circuit court work they very often are not indexed properly, if at all, which causes confusion in looking up suits pending.

Clerk De Lap is very much in favor of the creation of the new office, as he believes this work can be better handled by one man, who gives his entire time to it, than by deputies from his office. If the office should be created by the next legislature it is probable that it would be filled by appointment by the governor until the next election. At the present time George Chastain, deputy clerk, handles most of the circuit court work, and undoubtedly he would be considered as the most competent man for the appointment.

## Analysis Shows That City Water is Pure

### Klamath Falls Using Over 600,000 Gallons of Water a Day. Work On Third Well

According to a report just received from the chemist of the University of California by the California-Oregon Power company, the present water supply of Klamath Falls is just about as pure as it is possible for it to become. The test shows that the water is equal to that of any of the cities of the state, and much purer than many of the Willamette Valley towns. The report follows:

Berkeley, Nov. 17.—The bacteriological examination of the sample of water marked No. 1, received November 8, has given the following result: Bacteri count—20 colonies in 1 c.c. of water. Test for E. Coli—With lactose bile and pectin broth, negative, with 1 c.c. of the water sample. From a bacteriolog-

ical standpoint this would be regarded as a very satisfactory result.

The company has been furnishing water to the city for some time from the two wells, which were drilled this summer. These are 15-inch wells, located on the former Bonham place, and are connected, with a total capacity of 600 gallons a minute. At the present time the pump is being operated sixteen hours per day. This means that Klamath Falls is now using 600,000 gallons of water per day.

Work was started this week on the drilling of another 15-inch well, which, when completed, will be connected with the two existing wells, and increase the capacity by over a quarter of a million gallons a day.

## Use of Electricity Increases in City

### Capacity of Local Company is Increased 1200 Horsepower by Connecting Fall Creel Line

The Fall Creel line of the Oregon-California Power company was tied last night to the Klamath Falls plant, thereby connecting all of the power plants of the company in Oregon and California. Hereafter there will be no possibility of Klamath Falls being without lights or power for a moment on account of any accident to the local plant, as the entire load can immediately be switched to the main power line.

According to F. B. Bremer, electrical superintendent of the Klamath division, the use of electricity has increased at a very rapid rate during the past year, until now practically the full capacity of the local plant has been reached. The connections with the other plants will give an additional 1,200 horse power. A new 25-horsepower motor has just been installed in the box factory of the Klamath Manufacturing company at Shippington, and it is predicted that the coming year will see a large number of new factories started in Klamath Falls which will use electricity for power.
