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S. F. Walsh Imposter
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Will Not Permit Motion Pictures of Big Hanging

Governor says He Would Think That Permission to Take Pictures Should Meet With General Approval Throughout the State

SALEM, Nov. 15.—Governor West has received a copy of resolutions from Woodlawn Grange No. 350, protesting against the governor's permitting moving picture film companies to take moving pictures of the execution of five men condemned to die December 13th. The resolutions report that according to newspaper reports the Grangers understand moving picture houses have made application for this permission.

In his reply Governor West says no such requests have been made by moving picture firms. Continuing, he says:

"However, I should think that the granting of such permission to make such pictures should meet with pretty general approval, for it has been contended, and that contention has been indorsed, that hanging deters crime. Such being the case, and it being our sincere aim and desire to lessen and deter crime, wouldn't it be logical to contend that the making of moving pictures and the exhibition of them in such a manner as to bring the execution of this drastic penalty home to every man, woman and child in our state would go far to reduce crime and thus secure to the fullest extent those results so much desired by all?"

"You need not fear, however, that permission will be granted to make moving pictures, for the writer does not believe that hanging deters crime, and thinks it would be just as useless and barbarous to exhibit these pictures as it will be to execute human beings charged with capital offenses."

EIGHT HOUR LAW BELIEVED VOID

THE NEW MEASURE MAY BE DECLARED DEFECTIVE ON ACCOUNT OF THE LACK OF ENACTING CLAUSE

Because the words, "Be it enacted by the people of the State of Oregon" are not printed on the original of the eight-hour law, passed last week by the voters of the state, it is quite likely that the statute can never be enforced.

Supported by a state supreme court decision and by the decision of judges in a majority of other states of the Union, that a bill without an enacting clause is void, a search through the records revealed the fact that the recently enacted measure cannot be enforced.

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First Town Named in Honor of Wilson

SPOKANE, Nov. 15.—A survey of the new town of Woodrow, named in honor of President-elect Wilson, and situated on the Columbia River about a mile below the mouth of the Spokane River, has just been completed. The townsite is owned jointly by the Spokane & British Columbia and the Great Northern railroads, and will be placed on the market in the spring. The same crew that surveyed Woodrow immediately began surveying a link of the Spokane & British Columbia line across the Fort Spokane military reserve with a view to raising about the proposed government dam site at Narrows, on the Spokane River.

UNDERGROUND SUBWAYS FOR CONGESTED STREETS

WASHINGTON, D. C., Nov. 15.—Underground subways for pedestrians to cross street intersection where traffic is congested and passage is dangerous, is the suggestion made to American municipal officers by Consul General John L. Griffiths at London. Increase in street accidents caused Consul Griffiths to forward his recommendation to this country for consideration.

Two such subways are being operated successfully in London, Griffiths declares. He says they would be more generally used if the facilities were more gradual and access easier.

How motor vehicles are raising the death toll in London is a striking feature of Griffiths' recommendation. He says 410 people were killed and 15,000 injured by street vehicles last year in London. Of those killed the street cars ran down 26, motor omnibuses 107, and taxicabs 155. In six years, the American Consul states, more than 2,000 Londoners have been killed in the streets.

TO INVESTIGATE NEARER HOME

GOVERNOR WEST HAS HIS EYES ON LIQUOR CONDITIONS IN CAPITAL CITY—WILL BRING SUIT AGAINST BREWERY

SALEM, Nov. 15.—That the cold storage plant maintained in Eugene by the Weinhard Brewery company as a distributing center for liquor being shipped into a dry county is a violation of the spirit of the local option law if not the letter of the law, was the declaration of Governor West when he stated that he intended to request District Attorney Bryson and Attorney General Crawford to bring an injunction suit against the company.

This declaration of the governor followed a move on the part of the Weinhard brewery people to throw out the suits now pending in the circuit court of Multnomah against the saloons in the Jefferson street depot out of court on the ground that they could not be legally brought by Special Prosecutor Estery.

"I don't think they can make their point stick," declared the governor, "because I took extra precaution in fortifying Estery's position. In addition to having the court appoint him special prosecutor I quietly appointed him a special agent of the state, and besides I asked the attorney general to be associated in the case, so if necessary it could be brought on the relation of the state."

"But regardless of whether they make their point stick, we are going to look after the storage plant in Eugene. I understand they have lockers at the storage plant so one may order his booze and keep it on hand. It is a regular club. District Attorney Bryson will bring the injunction suit, and he usually gets what he goes after."

ROSEBURG MAYOR ASKED TO RESIGN

GOVERNOR WEST TAKES A HAND IN MUNICIPAL AFFAIRS IN DOUGLAS COUNTY CITY—THE MAYOR IS THREATENED

SALEM, Nov. 13.—Governor West has issued an ultimatum to Mayor Miceli of Roseburg. Miceli must resign and make way for some one who will enforce the liquor laws, or the governor will see that the suits to put the Roseburg Brewery and Ice company, of which Mayor Miceli is one of the leading stockholders, out of business are vigorously prosecuted.

"Unless Mayor Miceli resigns I have instructed District Attorney Brown to bring an injunction suit against the Roseburg Brewery and Ice company and also proceed to revoke the company's charter," declared the governor. "If Mayor Miceli gets out of office and lets some one in who will enforce the laws, there may not be need to prosecute these civil suits."

For some time District Attorney Brown has had the officials of the brewery company in court on a charge of violating the local option law. The brewery was supposed to be manufacturing nothing but near-beer, but the charge was made that real beer was being manufactured and sold there. The jury which tried the case first hung, six to six. Then in the election the brewery people made a vigorous fight against the re-election of Brown, who made a campaign issue out of his determination to fight the brewery to a finish. After Brown's re-election five directors of the brewery company went into court and pleaded guilty to violating the local option law, and paid fines aggregating over \$2,000.

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
