Changes Are Made In Line-up of Town Team

Fast Aggregation Will Give the High School Boys Hard Battle. Weight Limit Is Agreed Upon.

Important changes have been made in the line-up of the town football team. According to the latest line-up Crosby, Hopkins, Smith and French will play back of the line. Everett will probably play center, Murphy and Arnold guards, Arnold and Lavanek tackles, and Lyle and Chilton ends. Taken together they are a fast aggregation, and the high school boys will have to put up a good fight in order to hold the line. WHAT ELECTION DID TO TAX LAWS

GOVERNOR WEST OUTLINES NEW CONSTITUTIONAL RESTRICTIONS ON THE COLLECTION OF REVENUES

SALEM, Nov. 10.—According to an outline prepared by Governor West the following constitutional restrictions on assessment and taxation exist in the state as a result of the recent election: No tax or duty shall be imposed without the consent of the people or their representatives in the legislative assembly. Taxes shall be levied for public purposes only. The power of taxation shall never be surrendered, suspended or contracted away. No poll or head tax shall be levied or collected. The legislature shall provide by law for uniform and equal rates of assessment and taxation; and shall prescribe such regulations as shall secure a just valuation for taxation of all property, both real and personal, excepting such only for municipal, educational, literary, scientific, religious or charitable purposes, as may be specially exempted by law. All taxes shall be uniform upon the same class of property within the territorial limits of the authority levying the tax. The legislative assembly shall not declare an emergency in any act regulating taxation or exemption.

THE LEGISLATURE SHALL PROVIDE BY LAW FOR UNIFORM AND EQUAL RATES OF ASSESSMENT AND TAXATION; AND SHALL PRESCRIBE SUCH REGULATIONS AS SHALL SECURE A JUST VALUATION FOR TAXATION OF ALL PROPERTY, BOTH REAL AND PERSONAL, EXCEPTING SUCH ONLY FOR MUNICIPAL, EDUCATIONAL, LITERARY, SCIENTIFIC, RELIGIOUS OR CHARITABLE PURPOSES, AS MAY BE SPECIALLY EXEMPTED BY LAW.

ALL TAXES SHALL BE UNIFORM UPON THE SAME CLASS OF PROPERTY WITHIN THE TERRITORIAL LIMITS OF THE AUTHORITY LEVYING THE TAX. THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY SHALL NOT DECLARE AN EMERGENCY IN ANY ACT REGULATING TAXATION OR EXEMPTION.

AFTER BIRDS FOR BIG GOOSE STEW

SPORTSMEN WILL GATHER AT WILLOWS FOR A SHOOT FOUR DAYS BEFORE THE BIG FEAST AT SACRAMENTO

SACRAMENTO, Nov. 10.—The game committee of the Big Goose Stew, which event is to be given in Sacramento, rain or shine, November 24th, by the sportsmen of Sacramento to the sportsmen of the West, has begun procuring the birds which will be stewed for the big feast. NEW MEASURES NOW IN EFFECT

A LAW BECOMES OPERATIVE WHEN BALLOTS ARE CASE, AND GOVERNOR'S PROCLAMATION UNNECESSARY

Since the election and the adoption of several new laws, some confusion has resulted as to whether or not the new legislation is in effect, or whether it must await the proclamation of the governor declaring the result of the election. The question was emphatically decided by Judge Bean in the United States court about two years ago, when the court held that the laws passed by the people are in effect from the time the polls close on election day. It is true that no one may know what the result of the election is on a particular measure for several days, and the vote on a measure may be so close that the result cannot easily be guessed until the official count. Nevertheless, the court has held, the bill receiving a majority of the vote is in the law from election day on. Until the time of the official count positive information may be lacking, but this does not impede the force of the law if it actually received a majority.
