GENOVA, Italy, Nov. 18.—The police have been notified that robbers have just stolen from the Sanctuary Della Guardia, on Monte Sinaigne, the relics of four saints which were enclosed in cases heavily studded with jewels and precious stones. An attempt also was made to carry away the altar of the Madonna, which is covered also with jewels and precious stones, but without success.

### MUCH MONEY IS SPENT ON VOTES

STATEMENTS FILED WITH THE SECRETARY OF STATE CLAIMS SOME ENLIGHTENING FINANCIAL MATTERS

SALEM, Nov. 18.—Expense statement filed with the secretary of state show that a total of \$29,899.50 was spent during the campaign to defeat the graduated single tax measure and to secure the passage of tax measures endorsed by the state legislative tax committee.

The Oregon Equal Taxation League spent \$28,819.05 of this sum, the state legislative tax committee \$7,604.74, and Big Shot \$4,085. Through the time for filing statements expired last night, W. S. U'Ren, who during the campaign led the single tax forces and who is known to have spent large sums of money on the promotion of the measure for which they stood, has filed no statement. Advances received by the secretary of state are to the effect that he takes the position that he has seven days yet in which to file a statement, but an examination of the law fails to disclose any such provision. When a candidate fails to file an expense statement, the law provides that he shall be prosecuted, but no provision seems to be made for the prosecution of persons who expend money for or against measures, and fail to file a statement.

The statement filed by W. S. Dunaway, state printer, showed he had expended \$2,312.22 in fighting the state printer bill. A statement filed by Harry Hill shows that he expended \$350.35 in waging the campaign for the measure. R. A. Harris has filed a statement showing he spent \$22.50 on behalf of the bill to abolish capital punishment.

A. W. LaFerty, candidate for congress from the Third district, expended \$222.99; Thomas McCusker, candidate for the same office, spent \$699.39; N. J. Summit, candidate for congress in the Second district, spent \$124.25. The Cascade county committee expended \$2,981.07 on behalf of a measure to create Cascade county.

### SEED TESTING AT LAND SHOW

LABORATORY OF O. A. C. HAS BEEN MOVED TO PORTLAND FOR THE WEEK FOR EDUCATION OF LAND SHOW VISITORS

CORVALLIS, Nov. 18.—The government seed testing laboratory, with all its apparatus and the expert in charge, have been moved to Portland for the week, in order that visitors may see how seeds are tested for purity and germinating power. The amount of dodger in different alfalfa

### Grand Jury Will Follow Famous Carroll Case

Judge Benson and District Attorney Kuykendall Hold a Consultation And Agreement Is Reached As To Calling of Inquisitorial Body.

The Klamath county grand jury will be summoned immediately after the conclusion of the case against J. D. Carroll. This was the decision reached this afternoon after a consultation between Judge Henry L. Benson and Prosecuting Attorney D. V. Kuykendall.

The time which it will require to try the Carroll case is more or less a guess, but it is expected that it will be over before the end of the week, and that the grand jury will get down to business by next Monday at the latest.

According to Mr. Kuykendall there are many important matters awaiting the action of the grand jury, and it is expected that the inquisitorial body will be kept busy right up to the time when the jury must be dismissed, December 1st, when a new grand jury must be drawn.
