AGED EMPEROR WANTS WAR TO START AT ONCE

FRANK JOSEF MAKES A STATEMENT REGARDING MURDER

An Armistice Has Been Agreed Upon in Order to Permit the Burial of the Dead—Peace With Turkey Is Now in Sight, But It Is Certain That Trouble Will Emerge Between the World Powers.

United Press Service VIENNA, Nov. 19.—A dispatch from Budapest says that when told of the bayoneting of Consul Prochaska at Prishrod, Emperor Franz Josef said: "I was for peace, but now I am not for peace at any price." The Reichspost, a newspaper, demands war.

Armistice Agreed on United Press Service CONSTANTINOPLE, Nov. 19.—The Bulgarians have agreed to an eight-hour armistice to bury the dead. The slaughter during the last few days has been terrific. Corpses are piled high within and without the Chalafia forts.

United Press Service SOFIA, Nov. 19.—The Bulgarian plenipotentiaries were appointed today to arrange for a general armistice with Turkey.

Peace Is Near United Press Service BERLIN, Nov. 19.—Peace is near at hand in the Balkans. It is feared, however, that the partition of Rumania will be demanded.

Lives Are Lost In Los Angeles Blaze

Scores Of People Jump From Windows Of Burning Hotel. Number Are Missing.

United Press Service LOS ANGELES, Nov. 19.—Three people are known to be dead and twelve persons were injured in a fire which occurred in the St. George hotel. Four of the injured will probably die from their injuries. The known dead are: Mrs. Chas. Harrington, an actress.

Joseph Martin, a jewelry clerk. Julius Malone, hotel engineer. Mrs. Harrington's baby was probably fatally burned. Frank Beck and his wife were also seriously if not fatally burned. Scores of people leaped from the windows of the burning building into life nets.

REV. BRENDDEL MAKES ADDRESS

WELL KNOWN LOCAL MINISTER TELLS OF HIS LIFE WITH INDIANS—TELLS OF THEIR CUSTOMS AND MANNERS

Rev. J. G. Brendel of the Baptist church gave the students of the high school an interesting talk about the Indians this morning. He first told of his own life with the Indians, and then he showed some of the costumes which they wore. He also gave statistics to show that the Indians were not decreasing in numbers. He said that while there was a period from 1880 to 1900, in which the Indians were on the decrease, from 1900 to the present date there was a great increase in the Indian population. He stated that the majority of the people of the

United States had no knowledge of the Indians, or of their true life. He next exhibited some Indian relics, which he has carefully preserved. Among his possessions he has an old Indian tom-tom, or drum. He gave the students a good illustration of the way the dance, and he told of the old Indian feasts and ceremonies. Rev. Brendel has intimate knowledge of the Indians, having been a missionary among the Paines and other tribes for twenty-one years.

MANY FAVOR SELLING GROUND

SMALL PERCENTAGE OF VOTERS REPLY TO LETTERS RECENTLY SENT OUT BY THE KLAMATH COUNTY COURT

Although every registered voter in the county, with the exception of 275, have been asked to express an opinion as to the advisability of selling court house square, but 450 replies have been received. CITY CONVULSED OVER EXPOSURES OF DEGENERACY

FIFTEEN MEN ARE NOW UNDER ARREST IN PORTLAND

Y. M. C. A. Officers Attempt to Clear Their Shirts—Committee Is Appointed to Collect Evidence—About Forty People Are Suspected of Being Involved in the Scandal.

United Press Service PORTLAND, Nov. 19.—Fifteen men are in jail and there are about forty suspects in the scandal recently made public by the confessions of young boys.

The Y. M. C. A. has appointed a committee of seven prominent business men to secure evidence to show that the organization has not been involved in the scandal. The city is convulsed, not knowing who will be accused next.

Among those under arrest are Jack Rigo, gypsy violinist at a local cafe; B. Thornton and C. D. Brunner, proprietors of the A. B. C. restaurant at 443 Washington street; B. Healy, a clerk in a florist's establishment; H. L. Howe, credit man for one of the big wholesale hardware firms; Earl Van Hulen, an employee of the chamber of commerce; William Holman, a drug clerk; Earl Brown, clerk on one of the docks; Lionel Deane, an architect; Robert Johnson, clerk in one of the large clothing stores, and E. Taylor, a moving picture house employee.

The facts in the possession of the officers who have conducted the investigation are most revolting. The victims of the vice clique were gathered from among the ranks of elevator boys, hotel clerks, salesmen and other walks of life. A downtown apartment house, the residence of a coterie of the men imprisoned, was used as a den of corruption so vile as to keep it from being even faintly described.

WILSON TOGET EXPENSE MONEY

HOUSE APPROPRIATIONS COMMITTEE WILL START WORK TOMORROW TO GET READY FOR FORTHCOMING SESSION

Servians and Turks Slain in Big Fight

Report is Received that 20,000 Lives Were Lost in Three Days Fighting Before the City Falls

PARIS, Nov. 19.—A telegram from Ushub says that 20,000 Turks and Servians were slain in a battle which lasted three days, and which preceded the capture of Monastir. Military experts here are inclined to doubt the accuracy of this report. It is further added in the message from Ushub that the Servians had captured \$10,000,000 in cash after the city had fallen.

ELECTRIC CHAIR WILL CLAIM THE NEW YORK THUGS

JURY RETURNS VERDICT FIRST DEGREE MURDER

Actual Killing of Robert Rosenthal Is Credited to Four Performed Murder—Men Were Guilty of Capital—Justice Goff Instructs the Jury to Bring in a Verdict of Guilty

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Justice Goff's charge virtually directed the jury to convict. Like common sense on the eve of an election, both sides were confidently predicting victory this afternoon. The four defendants, however, in the belief that they have discredited their innocence at least on the charge of the Rosenthal murder, left the court room with their heads laughing loudly over a cartoon which represented them as unrepentant.
