HOGS UNEARTH A DEED LONG LOST

FARMER, FEARING PROPERTY WOULD BE TAKEN FROM HIM, HURRIED PAPERS AND LATER COULD NOT FIND THEM

WHITE SALMON, Wash., Nov. 22.—Chas. Frick, who pushed his goods in a wheelbarrow out to a five acre tract on the White Salmon River three years ago, has sold his land to the Northwestern Electric company for \$1,500 and gone back to Germany to live.

When the Northwestern right of way buyers began picking up land along the river Frick became so fearful that some one would get his name to a deed that he buried his deed, some other papers and money in a hole back of his cabin and fled from the country in the dead of night. He went to British Columbia, returning to Portland in the summer, where he recognized a White Salmon rancher named Murphy, thought he was after his land, and immediately left for Eureka, Calif., where he found employment.

A few weeks ago he returned to White Salmon, and the first man he saw was Murphy. Frightened, he hurriedly left the station, and detoured through the woods back of Underwood, approaching his cabin from the west bank of the river. The Northwestern had ploughed a way for its pipeline through his place, and some one had been digging his place, apparently in search of his treasure box. He himself could not find it, and became almost crazy, believing it had been stolen, and that now his wife, who had left him some years

TWO LONELY ELK IN THIS COUNTY

State Labor Commissioner O. P. Hoff has compiled a table showing the amount of game in the different counties in the state. Just how he secured the data is not known, but it is probable that he did like the little boy was advised to do, namely, put salt on their tails and then enumerate them. Here is the report:

It is estimated that Clatsop, Lincoln, Union and Curry counties each have 100 elk, while Columbia has 80, Tillamook 75, Lane 70, Grant, Baker and Umatilla 50 each, Willowa 45, Douglas 25, Linn, Yamhill, Clackamas and Wasco 15 each, Jackson and Washington 10 each, Harney 3 and Klamath 2.

Forest rangers and game wardens place the number of deer in the state at 80,000, scattered as follows: Curry 15,000, Douglas 10,000, Coos, 9,000, Jackson 7,000, Lane 5,000, Josephine 5,000, Klamath 3,500, Yamhill 2,700, Union 2,600, Harney 2,000, Polk 2,000, Crook 1,500, Lake 1,500, Grant 1,500, Linn 1,500, Benton 1,000, Umatilla 1,000, Willowa 1,000, Baker 1,000, Tillamook 1,000, Lincoln 1,000.

Mountain sheep are found in a few counties, Grant being credited with 5, Harney with 10, Baker with 50, Willowa with 90.

The counties in which bear abound are as follows: Lane, Douglas and Curry counties 2,000 each, Union 1,600, Columbia, Grant, Jackson and Lincoln 1,000 each, Tillamook 700, Clatsop 700, Coos and Josephine 500 each, Washington 400, Klamath, Linn and Yamhill 300 each, Baker and Crook 250 each, Lake 200, Willowa 150, Morrow, Clackamas and Umatilla 100 each, Benton, Wasco and Wheeler 50 each, Harney 40.

Antelope are found in six counties, Malheur containing 2,000, Lake 1,500, Harney 1,000, Crook 90, Wasco 20, Grant 15.
