WEEKLY SERMON
REBUKE TO IDLENESS
 By Rev. J. G. Brendel, Pastor Baptist Church

"We command you, that if any will not work, neither shall he eat."—II. Thes. 3:10.

The Apostle Paul regarded idleness, whether physical, mental or spiritual, as ignoble and disgraceful. God, Himself, is the greatest worker in the universe. If the veil of nature could be lifted we would see the Eternal Father at His work, busy through all space, alighting nothing, exercising His wisdom and power wherever a star floats, an ocean rolls or a lily blooms. Notwithstanding that He is master of the universe, one thing is clear: It is doing its work under the loving care of some great being of infinite wisdom and power. It is He who supplies the burning fountains of the sun. It is He who paints the blossoms and carries perfume to the summer rose.

God, who is never idle, will not tolerate idleness in creatures made in His own image. Work is life. Man is dormant until he begins to labor. Work is not simply doing, but being. You go through the South and study the nature of the turtle and the alligator. All they seem to care for is an existence. They move only when they are compelled to move. They aspire to no higher blessedness than that which they find in lying on a sand bank and sleeping in a sun bath.

For no better reason some people will not put themselves in reach of the living ministry. They are afraid of being shaken out of their moral indolence. One reason some people so seldom attend Sunday worship is spiritual indolence. They know that if they go where an earnest and intelligent man expounds and applies the word of the living God they will be provoked to think, and probably act. And the prospect of coming out of their spiritual stupor is very painful.

"In the sweat of thy face shalt thou eat bread." It is a law under which God has placed the whole world of mankind. Upon obedience to this law He has conditioned the welfare of the family, the establishment of state, the peace of society, the prosperity and glory of the church.

There is a definite weight of obligation overhanging every human life. If that obligation is not borne by the life to which it belongs, it must fall.

LOS ANGELES LAWYER WARNS AGAINST GROWING TENDENCIES OF INHABITANTS—FAMILY TIES ARE ENDANGERED

PASADENA, Nov. 23.—Independence of the American woman and brutality, drink and failure to provide for the family on the part of many men, as well as the generally loose attitude of both sexes towards the family ties, is gradually disrupting the American home, according to Judge Frank F. Forbes, a Los Angeles lawyer, in an address before the Christian Church club's club here.

Judge Forbes declared that a union of the denominational churches could in ten years cure the evils of the world.
