FEDERAL SLEUTH CAUSES GRIEF

BANK CARRIER WOULD HAVE HAD HIS LIBERTY HAD NOT ONE OF UNCLE SAM'S MEN APPEARED ON THE SCENE

PORTLAND, Nov. 27.—Silas Rich, 26 years old, and former paying teller of the United States National bank of Salem, was taken to McNeil's island Monday to serve a term of five years for embezzlement.

But for the coming of a bank examiner Rich would have been saved. The president of the bank was inclined to give him a chance to make good when he confessed, but the inopportune arrival of a national bank sleuth broke up all chances. The young paying teller was arrested on October 12th, sentenced by Judge Beas on October 19th, and taken to his prison cell November 25th.

Silas Rich was the trusted paying teller of the United States National bank at Salem. So implicitly did the officers rely on him that they never checked him up. One day he borrowed \$350 and said nothing about it. He was having financial troubles. Then his wife became ill and he borrowed another \$300. In all he took \$2,400 and then went to the president and told him everything.

Rich has made full restitution to the bank.

BULGARIANS LIVE FEARING TURKS

FRANKS STILL WEAR TURBANS BEING SUSPICIOUS THAT THEY BREADED FOR MAY RETURN FOR VENGEANCE

LONDON, Nov. 27.—Bulgarian peasants in the vicinity of Kirk Killinee are still wearing the turbans, for fear the Turks will return and take revenge upon them, as was done in 1876, writes Noel Duxton, member of Parliament, who has been visiting the devastated districts of Turkey in the interests of the Red Cross.

"Thousands are homeless," he adds, "and the distress is indescribable. One Bulgarian doctor alone is treating 500 cases."

Tobacco Will Pay War Cost

BULGARIANS HAVE A PLAN FOR PAYING ALL OF THEIR DEBTS INCURRED BY THE FIGHTING, NOW OVER

SOFIA, Nov. 27.—Bulgaria expects to pay the cost of war with tobacco. Much of the best Turkish tobacco is grown in districts captured by the Bulgarian forces. At present the country raises a fairly good grade of tobacco, but it commands a price a little less than half that of Turkish. It is confidently hoped that after the war, by means of a practical monopoly of Turkish tobacco, in co-operation with the Greeks, and by raising the price of Bulgarian tobacco to what is believed to be its real worth, the government will wipe out the war debt.

Railroad Gets More Right Way

LAST PIECE OF LAND NECESSARY FOR THE NATION CUT-OFF HAS BEEN SECURED FROM A BIG LAND COMPANY

With the closing of a deal by the Southern Pacific for thirty miles of right of way through the Hunter Land company's holdings in Southern Oregon, the last foot of ground for that purpose between Eugene and Klamath Falls has been secured for the Natron-Weed cut-off.

The right of way just secured extends on a part of the old Oregon Military road grant from Odell lake to the northern boundary of the Klamath Indian reservation. This section of the land grant was taken over last year by the Hunter Land company, in which Portland and St. Paul capitalists are interested. One of the terms of the deal stipulates that the railroad company shall set aside five station grounds, comprising an area of 300x400 feet each. The five stations to be provided for along this right of way will bear the names of Lenroth, Rogers, Carroll, Trowbridge and Whitfield.

The Hunter Land company is building an irrigation project which will water 20,000 acres. The water supply is to be secured from Fish lake.

The Natron cut-off between Eugene and Klamath Falls is now about one-half completed.

University Boys Out on Bond

CHARGE IS MADE THAT THEY VOTED ILLEGALLY AT THE RECENT ELECTION—THEY ARE INDIGNANT

CHAMPAIGN, Ill., Nov. 27.—All University of Illinois students charged with being illegal voters have filed bonds for their reappearance when called. The ten students arrested gave bond of \$200 each. H. M. Gleason, president of Champaign; L. D. Hall and H. V. Cantner, professors in the university, each gave \$1,000 bond to answer to charges of perjury by swearing in affidavits for illegal student voters.

Following the wet and dry election in Champaign last spring wet interests filed a contest, claiming that many students voted who did not have a right to vote here, and asked that votes in the second and fourth wards be thrown out. County Judge Spurgin specifically named 47 students who, he said, had no right to vote in Champaign, but there was not enough of them to change the complexion of the election.

After the fall election, in which he was defeated, and in which no students were challenged, State Attorney Coghshall filed information against the students who had been declared illegal voters by Judge Spurgin before the grand jury called to investigate the student riot at the Walker opera house in celebration of a football game. It has always been a mooted question here as to the right of students to vote in the city.

Students are wrath at the action taken, and claim it is retaliation by the state's attorney, because of the vote against him cast by students. The Civic League of Champaign, which pledged the students support in fighting the case, has employed three attorneys to defend those indicted. The faculty is taking no stand, although many professors urged the students to vote this spring to keep the saloons out.
