### NEW BOARD IS BEING PLANNED

**CROOK COUNTY PEOPLE GET  
BUSY WITH A SCHEME TO EX-  
TEND HIGHWAY FROM NORTH  
LINE OF KLAMATH COUNTY**

A new road into Crook county from  
the northern boundary of Klamath  
county near La Pine is being sur-  
veyed by Fred A. Rice, county sur-  
veyor of that county. The La Pine  
intermountain has the following to  
say regarding the road:  
Conforming with orders from the  
county court, County Surveyor Fred  
A. Rice and a crew of men, who ar-  
rived last night at the Caldwell ranch,  
6 1/2 miles north of La Pine, began  
work this morning surveying out a  
line for part of the proposed new  
county road. Mr. Rice began at a  
point on the section line some rods  
west of the Caldwell residence, and  
will follow the section line south to  
the Klamath county line, a distance  
of about ten miles. It will require  
three days to finish the survey. The  
section line runs direct through Ros-  
land and La Pine, on southwest of the  
Stearns ranch and ranger station, and  
so on to the county line. The court  
will act on the new survey at the Jan-  
uary meeting.  
A petition circulated by D. L. Pet-  
erson and signed by most of the land-  
holders along the proposed new road,  
was mailed to the county court sev-  
eral weeks ago. It is a step forward,  
and will be welcomed by the progres-  
sive people of the La Pine country.  
The movement was suggested by  
Road Supervisor M. F. Hawthorn a  
year ago, and received the inter-  
mountain's hearty indorsement at the  
time. He advanced the theory that  
all roads in the future should be  
built on section lines, and just suffi-  
cient amount appropriated from the  
road fund each year to keep the old  
county highway in shape for travel,  
the bulk of the fund, of course, being  
devoted to the new road until it is  
completed.  
Should the proposed new county  
road receive favorable consideration  
by the court at the January meeting,  
active work will begin on it early  
next spring. It is understood that it  
will be sixty feet wide, cleared of all  
trees, stumps and roots, graded to  
center the entire distance—will, in  
fact, be a road in every sense of the  
word.
