HOPKINS HAD

SOME VENISON

E. L. Hopkins, a prominent rancher, who lives south of the city, was fined \$100 and costs Tuesday by Justice Graves for having deer meat in his possession in violation of the state game laws.

Mr. Hopkins admitted the charge, but stated that he did not kill the deer. He said that he had taken Mike Galarneau and Tom Duffy to the lava bed country, which is across the line in California, on a hunting trip. One of the men shot a deer, and asked him to take some of the venison to his wife and family. Hopkins put the deer in his wagon and brought it across the line into Oregon, not realizing that this was a violation of the law.

Game Warden Ramsby, who caused

the arrest, says that he does not question the truth of the statement by Hopkins, but that the law is very plain, and has to be enforced. When he found that he was wrong Mr. Hopkins willingly paid his fine.

HOBBLE SKIRTS

OLD AS HILLS

PHILADELPHIA, Nov. 27.—The hobble skirt is more than 5,000 years old, according to Dr. Edith Hall, who has charge of the excavations in Crete for the University of Pennsylvania, and is here to deliver a course of lectures.

In her opening lecture Dr. Hall declared that the excavations so far made show that the women of those days, 3,000 years before Christ, wore hobble skirts, tight corsets and manish collars.

"Examinations on the island," said Dr. Hall, "will be materially assisted by the Balkan war, since under the Turkish regime the excavating is hampered by a great deal of tape."
