TYPHOON SWEEPS MANILA, KILLING HUNDREDS PEOPLE

TWO STEAMERS ARE WRECKED IN THE HARBOR

Town of Tacloosan Practically Wiped Off the Map—The Storm Sweeps the Islands of Samar, Leyte and North Panay—Another Typhoon Off the Coast of Mindanao is Now Predicted.

MANILA, Nov. 25.—A typhoon swept this city today. Hundreds of people were killed and the property loss will be millions of dollars.

The same storm swept the islands of Samar, Leyte and North Panay. The town of Tacloosan was practically destroyed. Two steamers were wrecked in the harbor.

Another typhoon off the coast of Mindanao is predicted.

Local Woman Gets State Appointment

Mrs. L. H. Bath is Appointed Special Deputy Game Warden to Protect Birds Near Link River Bridge

Mrs. L. H. Bath of this city has been appointed a special deputy game warden by State Game Warden Finley. She is the first woman in Oregon to receive such an appointment, and, according to the terms of the United States biological survey, she will be the first woman in the United States to be appointed to such a position. The appointment was made on the recommendation of Alva Lewis, agent of the biological survey, who has been in the city on official business.

SAVANTS CANNOT CURE BALDNESS

MAN IN DENIED FROM STANFORD UNIVERSITY BECAUSE HE ADVERTISED A BURN CURE FOR THIN HAIR

STANFORD UNIVERSITY, Calif., Nov. 25.—To emphasize its denial that it had discovered a cure for baldness, the anatomy department of Stanford University has dismissed an athlete who announced that he had conquered the bacteria which destroys hair roots in the scalp. Professor Frederick Migge, who opened an office in Palo Alto, and hung up a sign "Professor Migge & Co.," after his alleged cure had been given widespread publicity, was informed by Professor A. W. Meyer, head of the department, that his immediate resignation would be appreciated.

"I informed President Jordan of my action," said Professor Meyer, "and he heartily approved. The dismissal was made on the ground of his exploitation of an alleged cure for baldness, which he had begun to advertise in the newspapers. He admitted responsibility for the advertisement."

Several members of the faculty were pointed out as evidence that the bacteria are unconquered, so far as the savants know.

EXECUTION MAY BE POSTPONED

RIGHT OF THE GOVERNOR TO SET DATE OF HANGING IS QUESTIONED AND MEN MAY BE RE-SENTENCED

SALEM, Nov. 25.—Because the question has been raised as to the governor's right to revoke condemned prisoners and set a date for execution after the date set by the court, the expected hanging of five men on December 15th may not occur.

Attorney General Crawford in an opinion made public today says that it will be necessary to send the condemned men back to the different counties for re-sentencing. If this is done the executions will not occur on the same date.

The governor's right to bench hangings has caused the investigation.

One of the five condemned men was sentenced from this county. He is Noble Paulder, convicted of murder.

NEW STAMP ISSUE BE READY SSON

POSTMASTERS ARE NOTIFIED TO MAKE APPLICATION FOR PANAMA - PACIFIC EXPOSITION STAMPS AT ONCE

Panama-Pacific International Exposition stamps will be ready for sale by all the postoffices by January 1st, according to an order issued by the postmaster general. Postmasters are notified to make application immediately. They will be issued in sheets of seventy. The order describes the series of stamps as follows:

These stamps measure about three-fourths by one and one-eighth inches, the long dimension being horizontal. At the top appear the words "U. S. Postage," and "San Francisco, 1915." In the left hand border is a branch of laurel, and in the right hand border a palm branch. The one-cent stamp is green, and in the center appears within a circle a bust of Balboa, discoverer of the Pacific Ocean, looking to the left, and wearing a cuirass and helmet with a plume. The two-cent stamp is red. It represents the Gaton locks of the Panama canal. The five-cent stamp is blue, and presents the Golden Gate of San Francisco harbor, with the setting sun in the background. The ten-cent stamp is dark yellow. The subject is "Discovery of San Francisco Bay."

Johnsons Will Spend \$100,000 in Vicinity

Well Known Klamath Falls Booster is Coming Here to Make Final Arrangements to Plan Building

More than \$100,000 will be spent in making Harriman Lodge one of the finest resorts in the United States, according to S. O. Johnson, in an interview in Portland. Mr. Johnson and President Herbert Fishbacker of the Northwestern Electric company will arrive in the city this evening to supervise the final details for the carrying on of the work of rebuilding Harriman Lodge. "We believe that Harriman Lodge, on the Upper Klamath Lake, offers the grandest scenic setting that can be found anywhere in the country for such a project," said Mr. Johnson in a Portland interview. "The cottage plan is being followed in making a home for vacationers. There will be a great central pavilion dining room, around which will be grouped the cottages." These will be ready for occupancy by the advent of the next summer season. Access to Harriman Lodge is obtained by way of the lake from Klamath Falls. The Klamath Development company, of which Mr. Johnson is the head, has purchased twenty motor boats and launches, which will ply between Klamath Falls and the lodge. Both Mr. Johnson and Mr. Fishbacker are ardent promoters for Klamath Falls, which they believe is destined to be a city of at least 50,000 people in the next ten years.
