OLDER JUSTICE IS MOST ACTIVE

OLIVER WENDELL HOLMES IS
LEADER IN NUMBER OF OPIN-
IONS WRITTEN—REMARKS FOR
RETIREMENT SOON

Although Justice Oliver Wendell
Holmes of the Supreme Court is the
oldest man on the bench, he leads in
the number of opinions read in court
thus far this term. Justice Holmes
has read four out of six opinions. He
will be eligible to retirement from the
court December 28th.

COMPANY FORMED TO BUILD ROAD

GRANTS PASS AND CRESCENT
CITY PEOPLE RAISE THE COIN
TO START RAILROAD TO THE
TIDWATER

GRANTS PASS, Nov. 25.—Articles
of incorporation of the Pacific-Interior
Railroad company were filed with the
clerk of Josephine county Tuesday af-
ternoon, the incorporators being E. T.
McKinstry, George W. Colvig and
W. F. Quinlan.

The object of the new company,
which is capitalized at 10,000 shares
of a par value of \$10 per share, is to
promote the construction of a line of
railroad from Grants Pass to tidwa-
ter at Crescent City, Calif.

The incorporators represent a com-
mittee of business men of this city
who have been working along the line
of the proposed railway for some time
past, and it is believed that the finan-
cing of the project is already prac-
tically arranged.

At Crescent City the big lumbering
interests are entering into the move
for the new railroad, and twelve miles
of logging road built by the Hobbs-
Wall company will be included in the
company holdings, when it is suc-
cessfully floated. Crescent City and the
lumbermen are also offering strong
financial inducements, \$250,000 hav-
ing been already subscribed toward
the stock there.

The route of the proposed road is
through the big redwood forests be-
tween Grants Pass and Crescent City,
and it is to make this timber avail-
able that the lumbermen are enter-
ing into the promotion scheme, and
are contracting for heavy daily ship-
ments of the lumber for a term of
years.

A large proportion of this redwood
is now manufactured in the Middle
West, Mississippi River points get-
ting much of it. At present this tim-
ber is sent by steam schooner to San
Francisco or other California ports,
there reloaded on the cars, making an
expense of from \$4 to \$6 a thousand
that will be saved if the road is built,
and the lumber loaded direct for eastern
shipment.

The road will also tap the great de-
posits of copper ore in the Illinois
Valley, and will open up the rich ag-
ricultural districts of the same valley.

BABIES EMPLOYED IN BIG FACTORIES

NEW YORK LEGISLATURE WILL
CONSIDER DRASTIC LAWS RE-
GARDING THE WORK OF WO-
MEN AND CHILDREN

NEW YORK, Nov. 25.—The new
state legislature will consider drastic
legislation for the abolishment of the
employment of babies in state can-
neries and the employment of women
in iron foundries, according to the
announcement made here today by
the chairman of the commission ap-
pointed to investigate factory condi-
tions.

The recommendation will be made
that remedial legislation be enacted.
Miss Mary Chamberlain, who has been
investigating, swears that children of
five years of age are employed.

SOLEMN CHANT REPLACES ARMS

CHURCH USED FOR FORT IN TIME
OF WAR IS CONVERTED BACK
TO THE PURPOSE FOR WHICH
IT WAS INTENDED

WASHINGTON, D. C., Nov. 25.—
The old adage "turning plowshares
into arms" has been reversed in Nic-
ragua, according to a sidelight on the
recent Central American rebellion, as
told by Assistant Secretary of State
Adas.

The Church of San Francisco, at
Granada, Nicaragua, where the most
fierce fighting of the rebellion oc-
curred when the rebels were routed
in a decisive battle, was used as a
fort during the year of bloodshed
there. This church was one of the
oldest in the ancient city of Granada.
It was abandoned by its priests and
acolytes, and its nave turned into a
barrier against rebel bullets.

The clergy are again in possession
of the church, their solemn chants re-
placing the crack of firearms and the
whistling of bullets.
Several other small churches in
Nicaraguan villages were used at
times during the rebellion as fort-
resses or temporary havens for re-
fugees.

ARMY MEN ARE STRICT ON LAW

OVERLOADING OF TRANSPORT
IS NOT PERMITTED—TELE-
GRAPHIC REQUEST FOR PERMIT-
SION IS DENIED

WASHINGTON, Nov. 25. How the
army is setting an example in strict
observance of the new marine laws,
prohibiting overloading of big pas-
senger steamers beyond their lifeboat

capacity, as a result of the Titanic
disaster, is recited by Major General
Leonard Wood, chief of staff.
"In transporting troops from the
Philippines to the United States,"
said General Wood, "we recently had
a surplus of 200 men over and above
the lifeboat capacity. The command-
ing general wired for a special dis-
pensation to permit the departure of
the extra passengers, but we refused
point blank. We intend that not one
person more than can be accommo-
dated in lifeboats shall be carried on
any army transport."
