STATE CAPITAL TO BE ENLARGED

SACRAMENTO, OREGON, WILL
PLACE BEFORE THE PEOPLE A
PLAN FOR PURCHASING TWO
BLOCKS OF LAND

SACRAMENTO, Nov. 20.—Acting
upon the recommendations of the special
committee of ten appointed by the
Governor Johnson, the citizens' committee last night determined to
place before the people by initiative
the endorsed proposal of acquiring
two blocks of land in this city for ad-
ditional state capitol buildings. The
property is valued at \$700,000 by the
Sacramento realty board.

MODERN BULLETS HELP PHYSICIANS

PRAGUE UNIVERSITY PROFESSOR
TELLS OF REMARKABLE CURE
WHICH HAVE BEEN EFFECTED
DURING BALKAN WAR

BELGRADE, Nov. 20.—Remarkable
recoveries are being made by the
wounded, according to Professor Jed-
licka, of Prague University, who has
been working night and day in the
general military hospital here. Out
of 670 cases which he treated person-
ally, amputation was necessary in
only two. He attributes the rapid
and successful healing to the char-
acter of bullets used in the modern
war. Several of his patients have
already recovered from actual injur-
ies to the heart.

WEEKLY SERMON

THE CHURCH

By Rev. J. A. Stubbelfield, Pastor of First Presbyterian Church

"Paul went through Syria and
Cilicia confirming churches."—Acts
15:40-41.

Paul was strong for churches. He
knew what they were worth to the
people who were in them, and to the
towns they were in. The early set-
tlers of America knew the value of a
church to a community. Wherever a
little colony settled they provided
schools in which to educate their chil-
dren, graveyards in which to bury
their dead, and churches in which to
worship God. The sturdy pioneers
had but little money, and they spent it
only for necessities. They regarded
the church as necessary. They re-
spected the church as necessary. They
believed in building up the body and
developing the mind and soul. The
church was a most potent factor in
the formation of sturdy character—
just how potent, we can only esti-
mate by the amount of vice and crime
that now obtains in places where the
church has been neglected, and where
the church spirit is lax. No self-
respecting man wants to mix up his
family in a town where there is no
church, but in some towns where
there is a church building the church
spirit is so low that it has almost
reached the vanishing point. There
has just as well be no church in a
community as to have one with a
negligible power, but the absence of a
church is a most costly luxury to the
taxpayer. It is cheaper to prevent
crime than to punish it. The jail is a
more costly proposition than the Sun-
day school.

Judge Fawcett, a magistrate in
Brooklyn, has tried in the last five
and a half years, 2,700 cases, and he
remarks:

"During all this time I have never
had to try a man who was at the
time of the offense, or ever had been,
an active member of the church. I
have asked each young defendant if
he was a member or an attendant of a
Sunday school, and I have never been
answered 'Yes.' Whenever, by means
of a suspended sentence or merciful
device, I have seen fit to give young
offenders a chance to lead better lives
in freedom, I have in every case in-
sisted that the first thing they do is to
join a Sunday school."

A little more Sunday school and a
little less vice and crime would be
good for Klamath Falls. Really, we
have nothing to boast of in the way of
Sunday school attendance.

About one person out of every thirty-
four, here in Klamath Falls, attends
Sunday school. I mean, on an average
Sunday, a little less than one-thir-
teenth of our population may be
found in our Sunday schools. Many a
town of 1,000 population has a Sun-
day school attendance larger than
Klamath Falls. While we have five
church buildings, the value of the ag-
gregation is not enough to erect one
sanctuary that the progressive people
of Klamath Falls would feel proud
of. Good churches in a town attract
the better class of people; their ab-
sence drive them away. I do not con-
sider myself a knocker, for I realize
that no man can saw wood with a
hammer; yet it is well at times to
look the facts in the face and see
them as they are. Conditions here,
however, are not so bad as these facts
would seem to indicate, for, while the
number of Christian workers in the
town is small, many of them are of
exceptionally high class. We have
many men and women, too, working
in our churches whose superiors can
not be found anywhere.

within a few days after his arrival he
will dedicate the site for Holland's ex-
