

## Park Commissioners Buy Site For Park

### Nearly Four Blocks of Land in Heart of City Bought for Park Purposes

#### STOCK GAMBLERS ARE AIMED AT BY COMMITTEE

POSTOFFICE AUTHORITIES ARE EXPECTED TO ACT

Pujo Says That Fraud Orders Will Probably Be Issued Against Stock Exchanges and Clearing Houses—It is Charged That They Are in Conspiracy to Restrain of Trade, and Are Liable

WASHINGTON, D. C., Dec. 3.—Denial of the use of the mails and prosecution as in conspiracies in restraint of trade confront the stock exchanges and clearing houses of the country, according to Chairman Pujo of the house money trust investigation committee. In an exclusive interview with the United Press, Mr. Pujo said:

"I believe that it is clearly shown that the stock exchanges, some produce exchanges and most clearing houses are in conspiracies in restraint of trade. As such all of their interstate business should be barred from the mails. I feel certain that the committee will recommend such action.

"In their listed securities, the limiting of the size of their membership and by various other restrictions, the stock exchanges and clearing house associations have become in effect a hostile trust monopolies and amenable to the law. The New York stock exchange is a striking example of this business domination.

"The postal law will be invoked to exclude the exchanges, associations of bankers and brokers from the use of the mails in interstate commerce, unless a complete reorganization is made."

It is announced that corrective bills will be introduced in January.

This is a matter of importance in all, and we will gladly appreciate any help that will be given us in the way of raising money for the beautifying of the park. The league now has about \$100 in its treasury, but this will be materially increased through the dramatic production soon to be given by us."

#### BIRD MAN WILL GET LIBERTY

ONLY AIRPLANE OPERATOR TO BE CAPTURED IN WAR SENDS WORD OF HIS RELEASE BY THE TURKS

TURIN, Dec. 3.—Captain Riccardo Moizo, the first and only army aviator to date to be taken prisoner by the enemy, will be in a few days returned to Italy, according to a letter received from him by his sister here. He writes that his Turkish-Arab captors have arranged for him to return with the members of an Italian archaeological expedition who were also captured and held prisoners during Italy's war with Turkey. Captain Moizo was reconnoitering in a Blériot machine when engine trouble caused him to descend in the enemy's camp.

VIENNA, Dec. 3.—Goats in court circles indicate the early rehabilitation of Archduke Ferdinand Karl, who some months ago renounced his titles, honors and high command in the army in order to marry pretty Bertha Csuber, daughter of Professor Csuber of the Vienna High School. The archduke, who took the plain name of "Burg," it is said, will be rehabilitated by Emperor Franz Josef through the intercession of Archduke Ferdinand, heir to the throne. His wife is to be ennobled and given the title of "countess."

#### M'CLOUD RIVER A WATER SUPPLY

SAN FRANCISCO ENGINEERS ARE INVESTIGATING THE POSSIBILITY OF USING THAT STREAM TO SUPPLY CITY

REDDING, Calif., Dec. 3.—Headed by Loren E. Hunt, assistant chief engineer of San Francisco, ten civil engineers are inspecting the McCloud River to determine its value as the water supply of San Francisco if the Hetch Hetchy is unobtainable from the government. It is claimed that the supply is 800,000,000 gallons daily, enough to supply 8,000,000 people, and that there is a per cent more water available than Los Angeles can secure from its Owen River source.

#### ITALIANS KEPT OUT OF TURKEY

GOVERNMENT TAKES ACTION WHEN IT BECOMES KNOWN THAT THERE IS NOT WORK FOR PEOPLE IN GULFAN'S LAND

United Press Service—ROME, Dec. 3.—The return to Turkey of the thousands of Italian expelled by the Sultan during the Turkish-Italian war was today summarily stopped by the government, following a dispatch from the Italian ambassador at Constantinople. Without work to be found for a single person and without food supply sufficient to maintain the present population, not only in Constantinople but in the entire empire, the dispatch of the Italian ambassador declared the return of further Italians at the present time would be suicidal.

#### Office Seekers are Clamoring For Jobs

Statement that "Every Other Democrat" is After a Position is not Strong Enough, Say Leaders

WASHINGTON, D. C., Dec. 3.—When Chairman McCombe the other day said "Every other democrat" was looking for a job, he was not speaking with emphasis with which harassed democratic congressmen here discussed the matter.

There will be about 410,000 jobs in the government service when democracy comes into power on March 4th. About 100,000 of these are not covered by civil service rules, and will automatically be vacant on March 4th. Presidential appointments number 10,000. The annual salaries represented by the jobs to change hands reached \$22,000,000. This is a record of the first and second class appointments, which alone total \$22,000,000. Democrats in the house are anxiously considering the matter of the cent remaining Treasury bills to be sent executive order, making civil service rules (20,000) and postmaster's, and that of \$20,000,000 are now expected.
