WILL AID WOMEN IN CITIZENSHIP

STATE UNIVERSITY SENDING OUT
LITERATURE PERTAINING TO
DUTIES - CLUBS RECEIVE FREE
INSTRUCTIONS

EUGENE, Dec. 10 - The University
of Oregon is sending to the women's
clubs of the state aids to citizenship
study. Its plan includes a line of
reading for the home and another for
the club meetings. The aim is to se-
cure the necessary preliminary
knowledge of the structure and func-
tions of the state and federal govern-
ments and to analyze as far as possi-
ble the conditions and problems of
social welfare.

Concise written expositions of
the leading issues which the voter has
to render a verdict upon at the polls
by such authorities as Justice Hughes
of the United States supreme court,
and Albert Shaw, editor of the Review
of Reviews, are recommended as
guides in this study. These make
easy the approach to the pith of our
public problems. The university aids
with outlines, questions and analyses.
It also offers to conduct tests of the
results of these readings. It suggests
the securing of special lecturers on
topics needing additional elucidation.

The following is the first outline
sent out:

1 - Private Study of the Structure
and Functions of State and Federal
Governments.
A clear idea of the structure and
functions of the state and federal
governments should be the first aim.
A careful reading of the Oregon con-
stitution found in the Oregon Blue
Book of 1911 and of any recognized
work on American government will
suffice for a preliminary study. The
university will undertake to conduct
tests to ascertain the proficiency at-
tained by the members of the differ-
ent clubs in this part of the study.
2 - Conditions and Problems of
Progress and Social Welfare.

The main part of this citizenship
study will be taken up with discus-
sions in the meetings of the clubs of
topics bearing upon problems of po-
litical, economic and social progress.
A few concise books by eminent au-
thorities will be used as guides. The
guides with which this study will be-
gin are: "Political Problems of
American Development," by Albert
Shaw; "Conditions of Progress in
Democratic Government," by Charles
E. Hughes; the Oregon Blue Book
and Official Directory which contains
the state constitution.
