LETTERS FROM THE PEOPLE

Editor Herald:

I have read with interest the ser-
mons by our local preachers which
have appeared in your paper, and I
think it a splendid way to spread the
Gospel. I confess I have been out of
touch with the church for many years.
It seemed to me that the church was
not following the teachings of Christ.
It seemed to me the ministers were
catering to those who could contrib-
ute most liberally toward their sal-
ary—that they were not in sympathy
with the workers in their struggle to
emancipate their class from wage
slavery, but were ever the staunch
supporters of capitalistic rule, even to
declare it a "divine right." This, I
think, is the main reason that work-
ers are deserting the church when
they become educated to know the in-
terest of their own class.

Now, far be it from me to find fault
with the stand chosen by our minis-
ters. I say, stick to it. You know
which side your bread is buttered on,
and I can assure that the working
class will work out their own sal-
vation without your help, but when one
of the writers goes out of his way to
say unkind things about some of us, I
wish to ask for space for a few words
in your valuable paper.

In the sermon in the Herald on the
22d, ult., it says: "Who are the men
who cry out most against the order of
society. They are the people who
have found out by sad experience that
they cannot be idlers and obstruction-
ists without bringing down on their
own heads the just penalty of the law."

All of our readers who have read
the "Appeal to Reason"—and who
has not?—or who have ever listened
to a soap-boxer, knows that he refers
to the socialists, and as one of the
case-hardened socialists, I want
Brother Brendel to know that I have
no ill-feeling toward him for thus
classifying us. It is evident that he
knows very little, if anything, about
the socialist philosophy, and it is not
my intention here to instruct him,
but I wish to say a word of cheer to
"those who cry out against this or-
der." You, my comrades, I greet you.
You are "the soldiers of the common
good." You are ever ready with
words and deeds to help the victims
of the system you are striving to
overthrow. You know that a system
which has put 10,000,000 people on
the verge of starvation in this, the
richest land in the world, cannot con-

refused employment, is doomed to col-
lapse. You have lifted the veil from
history and know that the unequal
treatment of classes, unequal taxation
and the unequal distribution of
wealth is the three great causes which
have filled the cemeteries of the past
with dead nations. You love your
country, and want to save it from go-
ing the way of those nations which
live today only in history. You know
all of this, and more—and are devot-
ing your life to establish a new order
founded on justice and equal oppor-
tunities for all. You may not be quite
sure that the Bible is inspired, but
when you knock at the portals of the
Kingdom where ruleth He who said:
"Inasmuch as you have done unto
one of the least of these, my brethren,
you have done it unto me." (Mat.
25:40).

CAUCUSES ARE NOT APPROVED

SENATOR CLAPP DECLARES THAT HE IS OPPOSED TO THE OLD ORDER—LEGISLATORS ARE SERVANTS OF PEOPLE

WASHINGTON, Dec. 12.—Senator Clapp, the militant progressive from Minnesota, prides himself upon one unbreakable senate record. He is the champion long-distance caucus "dis-senter."

"It has been four years since I went into a party caucus," said the Minnesotan. "I was in a republican caucus the last time, but never again."

"I don't believe in secret caucuses, or conferences. I think the senators and representatives are servants, not masters, of the people. I think the master should know what his servants are doing in his house—as a general rule, at least. Of course, in time of war, it might be necessary for the protection of the nation to hold secret conferences—secret for the good of the country, but not secret for the good of those taking part."
