**TYPHUS WARNING
IS NOW ISSUED**

GOVERNMENT SENDS OUT PAMPHLETS TELLING OF THE RAPID PROGRESS MADE BY THE DREADED DISEASE

WASHINGTON, D. C., Dec. 13.—Beware of typhus fever!

This was the warning sent out to the people of the United States by the public health service, and which is now being disseminated in every city in pamphlet form.

Typhus fever, which it has recently been discovered through research work in public health service laboratories, is identical to Brill's disease, threatens to gain a deep-seated hold in this country, according to Dr. Wm. Colby Rucker, chief of the service. The epidemic now exists in the slums of New York in mild form, and unless immediate precaution is taken it will probably spread throughout the country. Typhus is also commonly known, according to Dr. Rucker, as "ship fever," "jail fever" and "the spotted fever." The malady is fatal in the major portion of cases, and is transmitted from man to man by body lice and other ways common to congested living quarters of the poor in large cities and on board ships.

The pamphlets now being distributed by the health service contains the discoveries and writings of Surgeons Anderson and Goldberger, in the Washington hygienic laboratories.

**EXPLOSION CAUSE
MANY LIVES LOST**

**HARBOR OF NAPLES IS SCENE OF

prepared a statement which will be given to the press.

"My God, not so tight," Garrison cried when the noose was adjusted. All of the men mounted the gallows unassisted. The first two traps were sprung at 11:39.

At 11:56 one of the three doctors said:

"They are dead."
The bodies were then cut down and placed in rough coffins.

When Morgan and Roberts were being taken through the yard to the death chamber, Roberts hailed the guards and said:

"So long, fellows."
Father Moore preceded the two men, chanting as he walked. The men displayed no signs of nervousness.

SALEM, Dec. 13.—Morgan, one of the four murderers to die on the gallows today, spent the last night in prayer. Garrison prepared a speech, which he expected to deliver on the gallows.

"I did not kill Perkins," Garrison told a guard this morning, "and I am not afraid to die."
Warden Bengen and Guard Snodgrass were told this morning that they must spring the traps. They did not protest.

"Everso Protests"

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 13.—Starting at 6 o'clock last night and continuing throughout the night, scores of speakers, taking turns, protested against the Salem hangings from the street corners. The speakers included several rabbis, ministers, merchants and professional men.

Early this morning the cold forced the crowd to race around the speakers' stands to keep warm. The speaking will continue until 6 o'clock tonight.

The crime for which Faulder today paid the death penalty was committed in August, 1911, at Erickson & Peterson's construction camp, near Chiloquin, where Faulder was employed as a plow-shaker on railway construction.

Saturday night, Faulder and other employees of the construction company went to Fort Klamath, and according to the testimony, all of them were drinking that night, and were still under the influence of intoxicants when they returned to the railway camp the next evening.

There had been several dogs poisoned around the camp, and when Faulder returned from Fort Klamath someone told him that a dog he had befriended had been poisoned. At this Faulder became extremely angry, and declaring that he would kill the man who had poisoned the dog, he went to his tent to get a rifle.

He entered the cook tent, where Louis Gebhardt, the cook, and an assistant were resting after the evening meal, and he asked Gebhardt if he had poisoned the dog. Gebhardt's reply was evidently not to the liking of Faulder, as he shot the cook, inflicting a wound that resulted in his death a few hours later.

After the shooting Faulder told some of the employees what he had done, and bade them farewell, saying that he would "take to the woods" to avoid arrest. He was finally persuaded to abandon this plan, owing to the fatality of trying to escape starvation in that section, and consented to remain.

On his way toward his own tent Faulder passed the tent where Gebhardt lay in his death agonies. Finding that the cook was not dead, Faulder attempted to enter the tent and shoot again at the prostrate man, but the men ministering to the wounded cook prevented his doing so.

Falling in this Faulder entered his own tent, and placing the muzzle of the rifle against his breast, he pulled the trigger. As this did not kill him he next tried a shotgun, and when the men rushed to his tent they found him suffering horrible pain, his left side being nearly blown off from the shotgun discharge.

After Faulder's recovery from his wound, a defense of insanity was set up, and to establish this, his brother, Norman Faulder, came here from New Zealand to testify as to the mental imperfections of the prisoner. Sev-

**Local Railway Station
Gets Gold Medal Again**

**Award is Made by Southern Pacific
Inspectors After Visiting Every
Station on the Entire System**

Southern Pacific station inspectors found the local passenger and freight depots perfect in every detail, according to word received by Agent Bailey last night. This means that Klamath Falls still has the distinction of having the best kept station on the entire Southern Pacific system between Portland and El Paso, Texas, including all branch lines.

The findings of the inspectors class the Klamath Falls station as the "Gold Medal" station. Agent Bailey is due to receive a gold bar to be added to the gold medal awarded the station agent last year, that being the first inspection since Mr. Bailey took charge here.

Ever since the Southern Pacific built its splendid passenger depot

here, it has been the gold medal depot. Heretofore, the freight depot has not scored perfect, but this year Agent Bailey and the employees of the company here are elated to find that both the passenger and freight depots scored perfect.

A great deal of pride is taken in the local station by the railway employees, and the neatness of the buildings has been remarked by many incoming passengers as well as railway officials. No notification is given as to the time inspectors will arrive, but when they visit Klamath Falls they never fail to find the station in perfect order, with no evidence of a hurried cleanup as a result of a "tip" sent from some other point on the line.
