LAND WILL BE OPEN TO ENTRY

NOTICE OF ACTION OF THE COM-
MISSIONER OF THE GENERAL
LAND OFFICE IS RECEIVED AT
LAKEVIEW OFFICE

Some land which was withdrawn
from entry as a result of the estab-
lishment of the Klamath reclamation
project will be thrown open to entry
February 1st. The following notice
has been received here:

The honorable commissioner of the
general land office has advised this
office that on December 2, 1918, the
first assistant secretary of the interior
directed the restoration from the for-
mer withdrawal for the Klamath re-
clamation project, of various lands, the
only of which is vacant:

SW 1/4, section 36; N 1/4 NW
1/4, SE 1/4 NW 1/4, section 35, township
40 south, range 13 east, and S 1/4 NE
1/4, NE 1/4 NW 1/4, E 1/4 SE 1/4, section 2,
township 41 south, range 13 east,
Williamette meridian.

These lands will not become sub-
ject to settlement until 9 a. m. of
February 1, 1919, not to entry, filing
or selection until 9 a. m. of March 2,
1919, at the United States land office
at Lakeview, Oregon.

Warning is expressly given that no
person will be permitted to gain or
exercise any right whatever under
any settlement and entry and prior to
February 1, 1919, all such settlement
and occupation being forbidden. In-
tending settlers are also warned to
ascertain the status of the surveyed
lands by inquiry at the local land
office by inquiry at the local land
office before making settlement there-
on. Persons holding valid subsisting
rights, initiated prior to the with-
drawal of the land, and who have
maintained their settlement on the
lands, will be allowed preference
rights to make entry on the lands
settled in accordance with existing

HEARST TELLS ABOUT LETTERS

PUBLISHER SAYS HE SECURED
SOME OF THE DOCUMENTS
FROM LONDON AUTHOR—OL-
VER CROSS-EXAMINES HIM

WASHINGTON, D. C., Dec. 17.—
Declaring that he had secured incrim-
inating letters which passed between
John D. Archbold and members of
congress from John Eddy, the Lon-
don author, William Randolph Hearst
testified before the committee probing
the campaign contributions this morn-
ing. Hearst declared that his maga-
zine retains copies of the unpublished
letters. The committee demanded
that these letters be submitted, to-
gether with photographic copies of
some of Archbold's alleged corre-
spondence.

Senator Oliver cross-examined the
publisher, who denied that he had
bought the letters. He would not
state how he had secured them.

Hearst declared that Eddy had sub-
mitted the letters to him when the
Independence League was started, be-
lieving that the publication would aid
the movement. He denied that he
had rewarded Eddy. He admitted
that he had several letters in his pos-
session showing that Senator Foraker
had repaid the money it was alleged
he had borrowed from Archbold.

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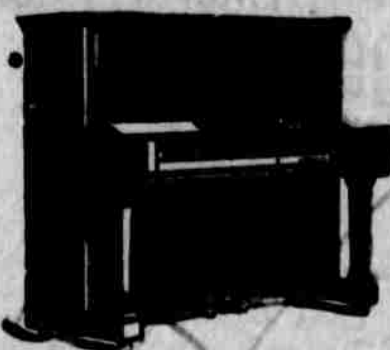
