## JESUIT FATHER IS AN ARTIST

LOCAL CATHOLIC CHURCH IS  
GREATLY IMPROVED IN AP-  
PEARANCE BY THE PAINTING  
OF BEAUTIFUL PICTURES


As a result of the work of Brother  
Joseph Carignano, S. J., of Portland,  
who has been decorating the Church  
of the Sacred Heart, the interior of  
that edifice has been greatly beauti-  
fied, and the local church, from an  
artistic standpoint, will compare fa-  
vorably with the churches in the  
larger cities.

Copies of the old masters and  
several paintings of his own were  
reproduced on the ceiling of the church,  
every detail in the work being beau-  
tifully brought out by the Jesuit ar-  
tist. In addition to this, he added to  
the appearance of the sanctuary, and  
transformed the entire interior ap-  
pearance of the church.

In the central panel of the church  
ceiling Brother Carignano painted  
"The Blessed Trinity" by Rubens,  
"Resurrection" by Raphael, and "The  
Good Shepherd" and "St. John on the  
island of Patmos," two of his own  
best known paintings.

Murillo's "Holy Family" is on the  
epistle side of the church, and on the  
same panel are "The Keys of Author-  
ity" by Raphael, "The Angel Guar-  
dian" by Brother Carignano, and "St.  
Michael and Lucifer" by Raphael. On  
the gospel side the paintings repro-  
duced are Guido Rene's "Annuncia-  
tion," "The Sorrowful Way" by  
Raphael, "The Apparition of Jesus to  
Mary Alacoque" by an unknown painter,  
and "Purgatory" by Brother Car-  
ignano.

In addition to his splendid work in  
beautifying the church, Brother Car-  
ignano also painted "The Flight into  
Egypt" and "Sunset on Spanaway  
Lake," painted in one of Tacoma's  
suburban parks. In this Mount Ran-  
nier, forty miles distant, is portrayed,  
and the wonderful execution of the  
artist greatly enhances the beauty of  
the scene.

The foregoing table has just been prepared by School Superintendent-  
 elect Peterson, who has recently completed a trip throughout the county,  
 posting himself on conditions preparatory to taking charge of the county  
 schools. Mr. Peterson comments as follows on the showing made:

### SCHOOL NEWS

(By Fred Peterson)

The work of the different school  
 districts throughout the county is  
 splendid, and speaks well for the  
 school interests in a majority of the  
 districts of the county. But the bur-  
 den of educating four-fifths of the  
 children of Klamath county ought  
 not to be borne by one-half the prop-  
 erty. For example, Merrill has a  
 school population of 164, and a valua-  
 tion of \$311,890. To keep up their  
 school they must levy a special tax of  
 11 mills. By, with a school popula-  
 tion of 49, has a valuation of \$1,242,  
 251, and levies no special tax.

Klamath Falls (District No. 1) has  
 a school population 44 times as great  
 as Crescent, but a valuation only  
 double that of Crescent. Klamath  
 Falls, with a large city tax to pay,  
 must levy a special school tax of 8  
 mills, while Crescent levies none. The  
 cost of the schools is not distributed  
 fairly. This remedy, of course, lies in  
 a larger general school tax, and in  
 consequence lower special levies.

The people of Texum (District No.  
 43) have recently dedicated their new  
 school house. They have one of the

best school plants in the state, and  
 are justly proud of the fact.

The people of the Upper Poe Valley  
 will erect a new school house the  
 coming year. Things look bright in  
 this district along the school line, and  
 under the direction of Mrs. Morris  
 there will be "something stirring" in  
 Poe Valley.

Teachers' examinations are being  
 held this week in the Riverside school  
 building.
