JUDGE ORR QUILTS NEVADA BENCH

FORMER KLAMATH FALLS MAN,
AFTER SERVING AS DISTRICT
JUDGE FOR SIX YEARS, AN-
NOUNCES RESIGNATION

Judge John S. Orr of the Second
Judicial District of Nevada, and for-
merly a resident of this city, has ten-
dered his resignation. He had been
twice elected to the position he is
leaving, and according to leading
members of the Nevada bar, he could
be elected as many more times as he
desired.

In announcing his determination to
resign Judge Orr said:

"I have been on the bench for six
years on January 1. The work has
been confining and very hard, espe-
cially during the past few months, and
at this time I take the opportunity of
announcing that I will retire as judge
the first of the year. This determi-
nation has been reached only after
careful consideration. I find that the
hard work is affecting my health, and
I need a rest, hence I have concluded
that I must retire after the first of
the year, and I will then return to
private practice of the law.

"The governor has not been in-
formed of my intention, and as there
are several days yet before the end of
the year, any ambitious member of
the Reno bar who aspires to sit on
the bench, and it is a worthy ambi-
tion, may have an opportunity to seek
preferment, and I wish him God speed
and success.

"This decision comes after the most
careful consideration. It has been a
long time, now, that I have held the
position, and the duties imposed have
been trying and exacting, and take
up practically all the waking hours of
the day. The field is now open to all
aspiring lawyers, and I only wish
that some man may be appointed
who may fill the position better than
myself. Whatever success I have at-
tained has been with the co-operation
and assistance of the bar. None may
succeed without this co-operation,
and I have no complaint against any
member of the profession. It is sim-
ply that I find it a duty to myself to
take a rest."
