**WILL ORGANIZE
FRUIT EXCHANGE**

**ASSOCIATION OF GROWERS IN
ROGUE RIVER VALLEY WILL
BE CARRIED ALONG ON CO-OP-
ERATIVE LINES**

MEDFORD, Jan. 1.—A call has
been issued to the growers of the
valley to meet at the city hall, Med-
ford, Saturday, for the purpose of or-
ganizing a farmers co-operative fruit
association. The committee in charge
consists of J. A. Perry, George An-
drews and S. A. Nye. Speaking of
the proposed organization, Mr. Perry,
who managed the old fruit exchange,
said:

"We propose to form a fruit ex-
change along co-operative lines. Mem-
bers of the present fruit and produce
association, who are mostly big grow-
ers, can join if they want to, but the
new association will not conflict with
the old. There is room for both, and
there is no reason why they should
not work together to some extent,
especially in maintaining standards in
pack and fruit."

Suing on Note
Through J. C. Rutenic, T. O'Brien
has commenced suit against J. L. Cun-
ningham and E. C. Greeley for the re-
covery of \$629.72 and \$100 attorney
fees. This sum is alleged to be due
for two notes given by the defend-
ants in October.

**BIRD LECTURES
FOR ALL SCHOOLS**

**STUDY OF FEATHERED FRIENDS
IS TO BE MADE THROUGH THE
AID OF THE UNIVERSITY OF
OREGON**

EUGENE, Ore., Jan. 1.—At the re-
quest of State Game Warden Finley,
Professor John F. Bovard of the de-
partment of zoology at the university,
will give illustrated lectures on birds
and bird studies before the public
schools of Oregon. In this manner an
effort will be made to interest the
children in birds so that they will be
able to distinguish between harmful
and beneficial birds. The lectures
will be given both in the country and
city schools of the state.

A course in bird study and in a
study of the more common insects for
the older persons interested in na-
ture study has been prepared by
Professor Bovard as a part of the ex-
tension or correspondence study de-
partment of the university. This is
conducted by mail, and is open to
any resident of Oregon.
