MONEY AVAILABLE TO EXTEND LINE

PACIFIC & EASTERN WILL BUILD
INTO BEND EARLY IN 1913, AC-
CORDING TO REPORT RECEIV-
ED HERE

The Pacific & Eastern railroad will
be extended east to a junction with
the Hill line, which was built down
the Deschutes River, early in 1912, if
a report which reached here last night
is true. The officers and engineers of
the Hill lines in Oregon have been in
meeting in Portland for the past three
days, and it is believed that an ap-
propriation has been made to carry on
the work.

Reports from the region of Bend
are to the effect that a large amount
of Porter Brothers' stock has been
brought into that part of the state to
winter. Those who are most familiar
with the winter conditions in Central
Oregon point out that winter condi-
tions are not favorable for winter
feeding, and they have begun to think
that the Hill interests are contem-
plating the rapid starting of work
similar to the commencement of the
building of the Deschutes line.

MUNICIPAL LINE IS MONEY MAKER

PROFIT OF \$635.75 IS SHOWN ON
A DAY AND A HALF OPERATION
OF NEW SAN FRANCISCO
STREET CAR LINE

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 2.—Profits
of \$635.75 on a day and a half opera-
tion is the showing made here today
by the Geary street municipal rail-
road, the first street railway operated
by any city in the United States, after
checking up Saturday and Sunday's
business.

The gross receipts were \$1,658.75.
Estimated operating expenses are
\$450 daily, and the fixed charges on
the bonds \$224 per day.

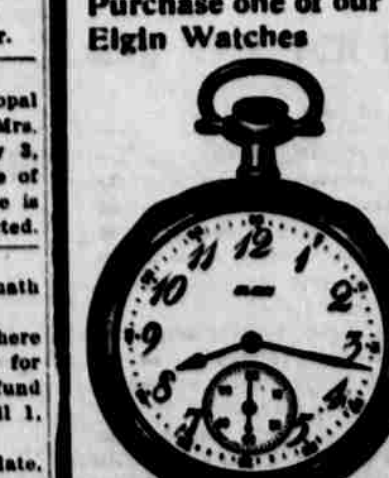
