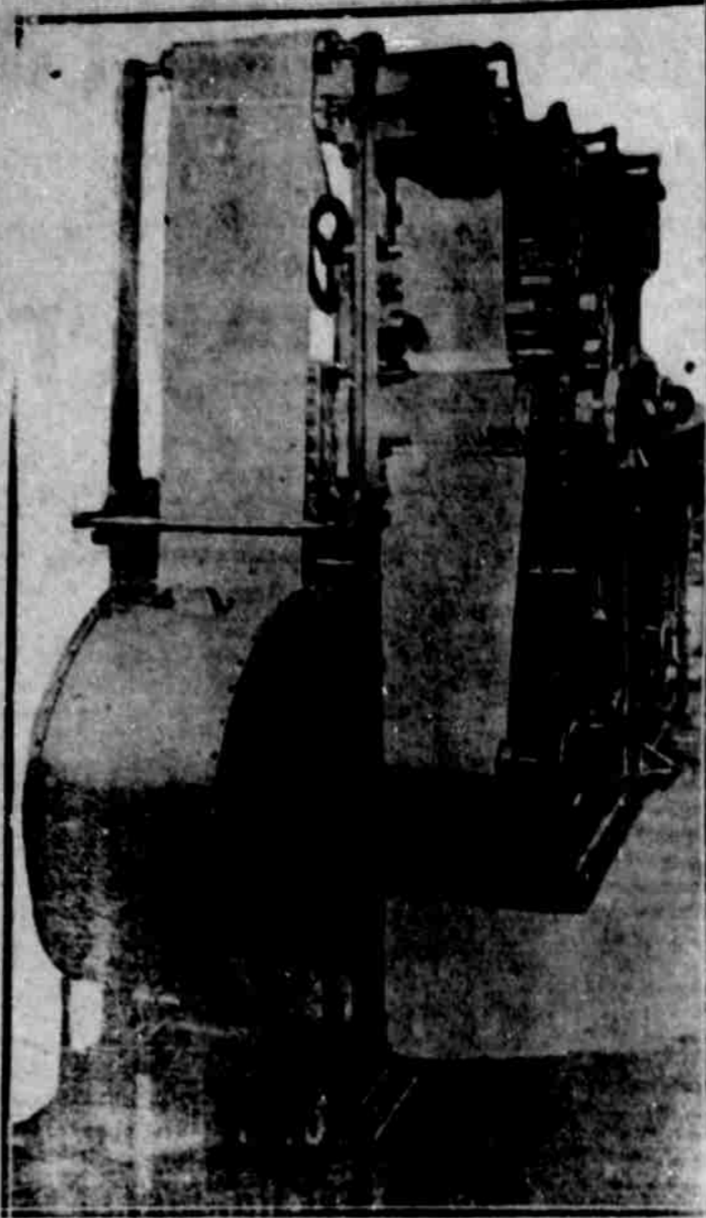

Prints Postage Stamps by Mile

A new plate printing press, recently installed in the bureau of Engraving at Washington, will print gummed and perforated postage stamps at the rate of 12,000 a minute. This is about 75 feet of stamps. The press is about three feet wide and something less than 35 feet long, with a height of seven feet. Human direction will be required only to run the press and to

direct the perforating apparatus connected with it. One man and a girl will make up the crew for each machine. The press is the invention of Benjamin R. Stickney a mechanical expert in the employ of the government at Washington. In the new process of printing nineteen operations are eliminated, and a saving of 57 per cent of the cost of doing the same work previous to the installation of the machine is effected.

"Loop the Loop" Plan of the Oregon Eastern

Trains will Start Out of Portland and After a Trip Through State, will Return by Another Route

The Oregon Eastern Railroad Co. has passed into the hands of the O.-W. R. & N. Co., according to information which has reached here from Vale, and the work of extending the line westward will proceed with more vigor than ever.

It is believed that the O.-W. R. & N. Co. plans to make the new road a part of a "loop the loop in Oregon" plan. It is believed that upon the completion of the road, trains will be started in Portland, proceed to Vale by either route and return to Portland by the other route, merely changing crews at the division points.

The Oregon Eastern began construction operations at Vale in May, 1912. Tracklaying from Vale westward started July 5, 1912. At this time, rails are laid and ballasted

with the best of ties and 75-lb. steel, a distance of 27 miles westward far into the Malheur canyon, two great concrete and steel bridges are finished across the Malheur river in the canyon, and two others nearly finished; more than two-thirds of the 2,600-foot tunnel at Mile 38.2 is excavated, and the Utah Construction company of Salt Lake City has most of the grading done on the right of way a distance of 80 miles to the westward. It will require three more years to put the line through to its coast connections, wherever they are destined to be.

The road is surveyed through the northern part of Klamath county and connection will be made with it when completed by the Southern Pacific road, already under construction north from this city.

NATURAL GAS AT SUMMER LAKE

RESIDENTS ARE EXCITED OVER THE FIND AND ACTIVE DEVELOPMENT WORK IS NOW EXPECTED TO START

The residents of Summer Lake are all excited over the fact that oil has again been found in another artesian well on the east side. This time on the ranch of Mr. Poley, says the Silver Lake Leader. He was drilling an artesian well and had struck a good flow of water, and where the water ran off and settled in pools he found it to be covered with an oily looking substance of a dark blue color. Upon applying a match this burst into a flame and burned till entirely consumed. A white foam accumulated around the edges of the pool which has the appearance of paraffine, when rubbed on the hands, leaving them soft and oily. A torch was held above the well and the gas ignited causing a brilliant flame to shoot about ten feet high, then settled to about three feet in height where it steadily burned until extinguished. The well is 400 feet deep, and cased 140 feet. The above facts were related by Jas. Sullivan who visited the well last Friday, and he is very confident oil in paying quantities exists a little deeper.

It will be remembered gas was discovered by Mr. Williams last summer in a well he was sinking near Dan Graf's place. It burned steadily when a can with a hole in the bottom was inverted over the well. Knowing ones pronounced it marsh gas having no commercial value. A short time afterward Mr. Spreckles, the sugar king, and a number of his associates, filed on desert claims in the immediate vicinity the ostensible purpose was to reclaim them and raise sugar beets. Perhaps Mr. Spreckles had other ideas and only made that move to gain time.

The people near have rushed to the scene of the excitement and most of the claims in the supposed oil zone have been staked out and filed upon. Further developments will be anxiously awaited.

Is Chairman of Inaugural Committee



William Corcoran Eustis of Washington, D. C., who has been appointed chairman of the inaugural committee, will enjoy an honor that is highly esteemed in the capitol city. The office is supposed to carry with it a recognition of marked business ability, and to establish that the person chosen is one of the leading citizens of the District of Columbia. The wife of the chairman is also signally honored, in that she leads the grand march of the inaugural ball with the new president of the United States, and thus is "the first lady in the land" for the time.

Mr. Eustis was born in Paris, France, in 1862. His father, George Eustis, was a representative in congress from Louisiana, and afterward chief justice of that state. Mr. Eustis is a graduate of the University of Virginia and the Harvard Law School. He was secretary of the American embassy in London ten years ago.
