James Foster, who has been visiting relatives here during the holiday season, returned yesterday to Red Bluff.

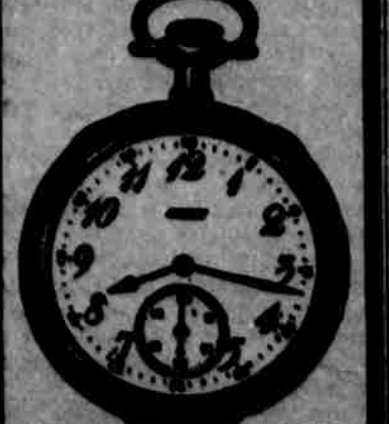
F. H. Dowling came in from Warden last night to attend the session of the Circuit court. He is a member of the jury panel.

JUDGE OFFERS LOW BIDS

SHOWN WITH THEM HAVE BEEN IN TOO MUCH TIME FOR ONE LAWSUIT TO BE OPENED. CASE IS ON TRIAL

This action has been in the courts since 1908, and in my opinion five years of litigation may have been all right in the case of Haddock or Nash, but as present it is entirely too long," said Circuit Judge McFinn this morning after hearing the history of the action of S. B. Correll against J. B. Correll and Mrs. S. B. Correll and Frank Ward in relation to recovery on a mortgage bond.

"We have become tangled and involved to such an extent that to overlook the merits of the litigation" he explained. "In view of the fact that the action was brought in 1908 by Correll against Correll to recover \$5,000 worth of borrowed money, consisting of two checks and bank equipment, covered by a deed mortgage, given Correll by Correll, the property was taken by the sheriff, but was returned to Correll upon his posting a delivery bond to the sum of \$5,000, with Mrs. Correll and Mr. Ward as his sureties.

The action came up before Circuit Judge Perry S. Kelly in December, 1911, and he granted the writ of habeas corpus to Correll, but the writ was set aside by Correll's attorney. Correll continued to continue with the trial and a judgment against Correll was given Correll. The property under the deed mortgage has not been returned to Correll, or redelivered to the sheriff, and the present action is brought by Correll to recover from the bondsmen, Correll is not in the city.

George Haddock and Thomas Haddock, appearing for the defense, told the court that Judge Kelly had in giving a writ for Correll that Correll had given notice of appeal to the Supreme court in his state and against Circuit Judge McFinn, but that this point should be brought up to the Supreme court at the time.

J. C. Stevenson and William S. Stevenson are the attorneys for Correll. The jury selected to conduct S. W. McCoy, Ed. DePue, H. Steinhilber, Frank Carpenter, E. G. Orr, Ellis Young, S. S. C. Williams, S. A. Hamill, Charles Thomas, Frank Downing, H. A. Talbot and S. W. Williams.
