Money King is in Shape, Say Physicians

Rockefeller Declared to be Suffering From Ailment Which Might Cause Death. Physicians Say He Can Scarcely Whisper and Signs Name with Effort

WASHINGTON, Jan. 7.—Chairman Fujo of the Money Trust Probe committee announced today that he was determined that the committee's own medical experts shall examine Rockefeller and decide whether he will be able to testify.

Doctors Walter Chappell and Samuel Lamont, Rockefeller's physicians, made affidavits today that he was suffering from "gouty inflammation of the larynx and windpipe, causing a swelling of the vocal cords which might endanger his life."

Rockefeller had undergone six operations and was scarcely able to whisper. He declared that a severe attack might prove fatal and ordered his patient not to talk. The patient trembled violently and it is with difficulty that he is able to sign his name.

owers Take a Hand in the Balkan Trouble

intervention is Promised in Event
of Peace Envoys Deciding not to
Continue Peace Negotiations

LONDON, Jan. 7.—Foreign Minister Grey stated in the house of commons today that if the peace envoys were not disposed to re-open negotiations immediately the powers would intervene. He admitted that the powers were considering joint action to force peace, but he declined to state the details, saying the situation was delicate.

LONDON, Jan. 7.—It has been semi-officially learned that the envoys of the allies will give Turkey until Saturday to request the reopening of negotiations. If Turkey does not make this request, the representatives of the Balkan states will re-convene and formally break negotiations.

Diplomats do not expect a renewal of the war. The Turk envoys were up all night exchanging code telegrams with Constantinople. The situation is extremely delicate.
