### TWO OF CREW OF ROSECRANS ARE REPORTED SAFE

LIFE SAVERS FROM PORT CANNY MAKE RESCUE

Unable to Land, the Crew put Out to Sea and are Taken Aboard the Light Ship Stationed off the Mouth of the Columbia River. Rescuers and Survivors are Expected in the Afternoon.

ASTORIA, Ore., Jan. 9.—The tug Onemin this morning removed the crew of the Port Canny life saving station and two survivors of the ill fated steamer Rosecrans from the lightship outside of the mouth of the Columbia river. It is expected that the tug will arrive in Astoria this afternoon.

The life savers with the survivors were unable to land and put out to the light ship for safety.

### NEW BILL READY FOR APPROVAL

CALIFORNIA ASSEMBLYMAN HAS MEASURE WHICH WILL TAKE CARE OF STATE AFFAIRS AND BE STEP FORWARD

SACRAMENTO, Jan. 9.—Assemblyman Mouser has completed a bill to create a board of administration which, it is proposed, shall have charge of all state institutions except prisons and the state university. The bill provides for an appointive commission at a salary of \$4,000 each annually. The board will not encroach on the state board of control but will handle only administrative affairs.

### THREE DIE IN A 'FRISCO FIRE

MAN PERISHES, MARITIME LODGING HOUSE IS DESTROYED AND MANY ARE INJURED IN JUMPING FROM THE WINDOWS

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 9.—Three people are known to be dead and 13 were injured, several fatally, while five others are reported to be buried under the ruins of the San Pedro, a maritime lodging house, which was destroyed by fire early this morning.

Three charred bodies, not yet identified, were removed from the ruins this morning. The building was four stories in height and many were injured in jumping from the windows.

## "Won't Mix in Family Affairs," Says Noted Portland Jurist

### BOHNSON TELLS OF SITUATION

DECLARES THAT FAILURE OF THE ORANGE CROP IN CALIFORNIA WILL NOT CAUSE SHUT DOWN OF ANY PROPERTIES

Owing to the heavy snow in the vicinity of Grass Lake, the logging operations of the Wood Lumber Company have been greatly interfered with, and it has been found necessary to shut down all logging in that section.

If the snow remains on the ground for any length of time, it will necessitate the suspending of work at the Wood Lumber Company's big mills at Weed, on account of the shortage of logs.

"There is not truth to the statement that this shut down comes as a result of the countermanding of orders for box lumber," says W. Paul Johnson of the S. S. Johnson Company, who is visiting this city. "It has been reported that the recent frost in California practically ruined the entire fruit crop, and resulted in the countermanding of large orders for fruit box lumber. So far as the Wood Lumber Company is concerned, their threatened shut down will result from the inability to get out logs."

T. W. Murphy, a well known Wood timber cruiser, is here to attend to business matters.

### TURKS LOOK TO POWERS TO HELP

REPRESENTATIVE OF THE SULTAN SAYS THAT HE CAN DO NOTHING MORE. DECLARES THAT HE HAS CONCEDED MUCH

LONDON, Jan. 9.—Nevay Reschid of Turkey stated today that the Turkey envoys were powerless to make further concessions.

"As far as I am concerned," he said, "the whole matter rests with the powers. I am not prepared to ask for a renewal of the peace conference without direct instructions from Constantinople."

"We have conceded everything possible. The allies have given nothing. We surrendered 100,000 kilometers of Turkish territory."

### MANDAMUS CASE BARRED ON NEW PLEA SUBMITTED

### Memory of White Lake City Bobs to the Fore

### Deed for Lot in a Almost Forgotten Community is Received for Recording. Many Veterans

Memories of a little city in the old Klamath valley in this county a few years ago, is recalled by the receipt of a deed for recording in the county clerk's office. The deed is for lot 16, block 25 of White Lake city, and was executed June 1, 1900 by the Oklahoma & Oregon Forestry Company to Klamath National of Portland, Ore.

In the early days of the settlement of this county, many veterans of the Civil War and the Spanish-American War, and also many of the pioneers, had settled in the White Lake community. Many of these veterans and pioneers are now deceased, and their families are scattered throughout the county.
