alkaline condition of the soil.

SUB-LATERALS ARE LOCATED

ENGINEER SARGEANT RETURNS
FROM TRIP. FROZEN GROUND
PUTS STOP TO WORK ON
SECOND UNIT LATERALS

Engineer William Sargeant return-
ed yesterday from Poe Valley, where
he has been in charge of a party lo-
cating sub laterals through lands not
crossed by the main ditches of the
Second Unit. On account of the frozen
ground and the depth of the snow in
drifts, the work has been discontinued
for the winter, and the crew will
return to town Saturday.

The survey has been completed
enough to determine what rights of
way will be needed for the sub lat-
erals which will run from the North
and South Poe Valley laterals. The
Reclamation Service will be able to
take up the matter of getting the
rights of way for small ditches at
once, so the work of digging the sub
laterals can be taken up in the
spring by the contractors.

"All of the locating, with the ex-
ception of some drains, has been
completed," said Mr. Sargeant today.
"These drains are to be dug by the
Reclamation Service with the exca-
vator recently purchased, so there is
no particular hurry for the comple-
tion of the survey this winter."

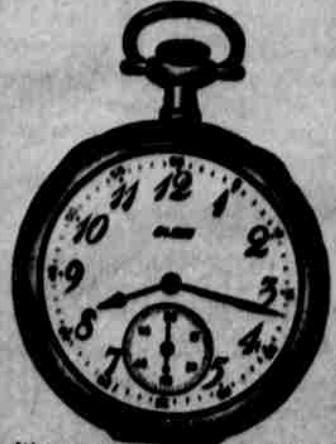
