ROUMANIA AND BULGARIA NOW HAVING TROUBLE

ARMY TERRITORY DEMANDS ARE MET WAR IS CERTAIN

Two Navys Meet Tomorrow at the Request of Lord Grey—This is taken as an indication that the powers will intervene in the matter of settling the trouble with the Ottoman Empire

Paris, Jan. 10.—It was semi-officially learned today that Roumania formally notified the powers that would invade Bulgaria within two weeks unless Bulgaria grants Roumania territory demands.

London, Jan. 10.—The peace conference will probably meet tomorrow at the request of Lord Grey. This probably amounts to foreign intervention.

Washington, D. C., Jan. 10.—The ambassador has resumed consultation, but the governments have not yet authorized them to act.

Up to noon the Turks and the allies had not requested an opening of a conference, although St. James Palace is prepared. Each side says it is up to the other to act. Before tomorrow it is expected that the powers will be ready to intervene and compel Turkey to grant the demands of the allies.

SACRAMENTO, Jan. 10.—As an emergency measure, the assembly passed through the senate a bill providing \$900 for expenses for the election to go East.

MERCHANTS URGE PASSAGE OF NEW WAGE SCALE BILL

NEED OF MINIMUM PRICE IS POINTED OUT

Responsiveness for Women and Miners is Believed to Be Far Too Low. Conditions at Present Time Contribute to Poverty, Physical Deficiency and Moral Delinquency, is the Belief

The members of the Grocers and Merchants Association of Oregon are working for the passage of a minimum wage bill up for passage at the coming session of the legislature.

The following resolutions were recently adopted by the association:

"Whereas, The Consumers' League of Oregon, an organization closely associated with the moral uplift and social advancement of the women and minors of the state, has outlined and is preparing to submit a legislative measure providing for the supervision and control of trade conditions by an industrial welfare commission; and

"Whereas, This association firmly believes that the present responsiveness for the labor of women and miners is in many cases wholly inadequate to their actual needs and contribution to poverty, physical deficiency and moral delinquency;

"Resolved, That the industrial welfare bill, as drafted by the Consumers League of Oregon, is practicable in principle and construction, and holds forth a corrective to the present appalling social conditions of our state;

"Resolved, That as an organization composed of merchants who believe in and practice the principle of 'equitable wage for service,' endorsement be given the minimum wage bill and every influence and assistance be lent to its passage.

"Resolved, That a copy of these resolutions be spread upon the minutes of this association, their substance published in the daily press, and a copy forwarded to the social survey committee of the Consumers League of Oregon."

Appraisers Determine Value County Property

Board Appointed in December Meets Tomorrow to Appraise Property Prior to Sale Announcement

For the purpose of determining the value of the portion of the court house site to be sold, an appraisal will be made tomorrow afternoon by Alex Martin Sr. of this city, Dan Ryan of Fort Klamath and E. S. Turwilliger of Merrill. These men were appointed as a board of appraisers several weeks ago by the county court.

The property they will appraise is the westerly half of lots 4, 5 and 6, of block 35, the site of the present court house.

This is the second step in connection with the disposal of the Main street site. Following a request for their views of the method of disposing of the site, 481 taxpayers wrote requesting that the property be sold, and 211 asked that the county court retain the block. The county court then announced that the property would be sold, and a few days later the board of appraisers was named.

The date of the sale will be announced by the county court shortly after the report of the appraisers upon the value of the site.
