INDIAN SCHOOL CASE UP NOW ON A TECHNICALITY

MURKIN IS FILED IN FORT KLAMATH ACTION

Battle to Force School Directors Allow Children of Mixed Blood Enter White Schools is Now on All Tilt—Judge Drake and Kay-Edell & Ferguson Prepare Objections

The latest proceeding in the petition of William Crawford for an alternative writ of mandamus to compel the school directors and clerk of Fort Klamath district to admit children, who are of Indian lineage to the school for whites, is in the hands of demurrers filed today. The demurrers are in answer to the petition filed a few days ago by M. O'Neill, attorney for Crawford. Both are filed by Thomas Drake, Kay-Edell & Ferguson, one demurrer for M. F. Loeber, clerk of the court, the other for E. S. Turner, Loeber and H. A. Moon, the directors.

In addition to a general demurrer allowing additional grounds are in the papers filed this afternoon. The court has no jurisdiction of the persons of the defendants, the subject of the action; that the plaintiff has not the legal title to sue; that there is a defect in parties defendant and his wife are the children.

COUNTY COURT TO ARRANGE SALE AT NEXT MEETING

CORNER LOTS VALUED AT \$250 FRONT FOOT

Inside Lots Are Valued at \$100 Per Front Foot—Most Valuable Part of the County Square is Yet to Be Valued—It is Expected That the Total Will Be More Than Hundred Thousand Dollars

The west half of the present west house site is worth \$51,000. This is the opinion arrived at by Alan Martin, Jr., of this city and E. S. Spradlinger of Merrill, the board of appraisers, after viewing the property this afternoon.

The west half of block 35 is divided into ten lots, five fronting on Main street and five on Klamath avenue. The lots each have a frontage of 25 feet.

The two corner lots, one at the intersection of Main and Third streets, the other at Klamath avenue and Third street, are valued at \$250 per front foot by the appraisers. The other lots are estimated at \$100 per front foot.
