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WEEKLY SERMON

How Prayer Helps

Ask, and it shall be given you; seek, and ye shall find; knock, and it shall be opened unto you: For every one that asketh, receiveth; and he that knocketh, it shall be opened.—Matt. 7:7-8.

It is an axiom in the Christian world that God hears and is moved by prayer. He also assists us in the matter of prayer.

In Christ's teachings the greatest of importance is attached to prayer. He therefore would overcome the natural backwardness of unbelief in prayer.

Through prayer is indicated the kindness of God. It affords to mankind a ground of confidence and hope. It instructs us to ask for things outside of and above ourselves. It equips us for the relations of life, prepares for a better life, and satisfies the hunger of soul with reference to the future life.

The trinity of prayer as outlined by the Savior is in the asking, seeking and knowing. He who asks, in simplicity, makes his request. He who seeks, with the aim of a broader intelligence, presses his claim. He who knows, in the desperation of soul, persists to the last extremity in his appeal to God.

In other words, he asks with his heart, seeks with the mind, knocks with the will.

The assurance is that God loves the one who asks. To ask a favor of another is not so easy. We would rather ask favors for another. Pride stands in the way of a confession of ignorance or lack of anything. Few are the people, for this reason, that personally interview their pastor for aid with reference to the develop-ment of their moral character or spiri-tual life. Some in sacred awe of the confessional may do so. But the probability is that even then much may be withheld. The lack of a sense of need may influence the petitioner. Little need—little asking. Little need—little required. He who dwells in a wigwam, will not seek for the fur-niture of a mansion.

So it is with the requirements of the soul. A little conception of it re-quires little prayer for it.

Prayer is a personal matter. Even to importune for others requires per-sonal effort. If in great need, over-whelmed by the guilt of sins, unclear because of unholy outcroppings or impure desires, enlarging of the mind enabling a broader view of Jesus Christ and his mission, a mellowing of a hardened heart, a temporal or spiritual deliverance or guidance, the personal effort must be put forth.

God's promises are: "He will re-gard the prayer of the destitute, and not despise their prayer." "Ask, and it shall be given you; for everyone that asketh receiveth."

The effort put forth is active and passive in character. You ask, and reach out—You take hold and draw in. You approach the throne of blessings from God.

FLOWER SEEDS WILL BE FREE

WOMEN'S CIVIC LEAGUE WILL
DISTRIBUTE SEEDS AGAIN THIS
SPRING—A QUANTITY RECEIV-

Distribution of flower seeds to resi-
dents of Klamath Falls is to be taken
up again in the spring by the Wo-
men's Civic League in its work for
the "City Beautiful." Last year the
organization did splendid work to-
ward the improvement of civic condi-
tions, and this year the work will be
persecuted further.

A big quantity of flower seeds sent
by the department of agriculture has
just been received by Albert E. Elder,
secretary of the Klamath Water Users
Association, and today he placed the
pockets at the disposal of the Civic
League, to be distributed by the mem-
bers in the spring. In addition to the
government flower seeds, the league
may also purchase more seed.
