Saturday two brothers named Moss who knew Tornow, met him while hunting. They fled, and in an exhausted condition reached here with the news.

CURE MAN TO MAKE A SOLDIER

"KNOCK-KNEED" YOUNGSTER'S WISH IS GRATIFIED AFTER HE WRITES A LETTER TO RULER OF THE GERMANS

BERLIN, Jan. 13.—That all Germans are not opposed to military service is shown by a little incident which has just become public. Herr Burchardt, son of a landowner, wanted to become a soldier. He was rejected because he was "knock-kneed," his legs having the appearance of a "K." Young Burchardt wrote a touching appeal to the emperor, asking his aid to become a soldier. The emperor sent Burchardt to the royal surgical clinic at Koenigsberg, where it was found that he could be cured and his legs straightened. The emperor ordered that the bill be sent to him, and Burchardt will become a soldier in a few months.
