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TURKS PLAN TO START FIGHTING

SESSION OF THE GRAND COUNCIL IS CALLED TO CONSIDER MATTER—ENVOYS ARE STILL IN LONDON

CONSTANTINOPLE, Jan. 14.—A session of the grand council was called today by Grand Vizier Kamall Pasha to determine the question of continuing war against the Balkan kingdoms. The strictest secrecy is being maintained regarding proceedings.

LONDON, Jan. 14.—Unless the peace terms proposed by the Balkan allies are accepted immediately, the present armistice with Turkey will be terminated, and the war resumed. A notification to this effect was served upon Lord Grey, the British foreign secretary, today.
