GOOD HORSES ARE IN DEMAND

GOVERNMENT FINDS DIFFICULTY IN GETTING SUITABLE MOUNTS FOR CAVALRY—VARIOUS REASONS ASSIGNED

The following item clipped from the Journal of Commerce will be of interest to the farmers of this section.

"Deterioration in the quality of horses is complained of by the United States army. Cavalry officers find it difficult to get good mounts for their regiments, whereas a few years ago the service was perhaps better mounted than any other similar body. Various reasons are assigned for this change in conditions, one being that horse raising is less profitable now than formerly, because of the lessened need for horseflesh since the invention of horseless vehicles and other devices for dispensing with the services of the equine family. This rapidly increasing defect has not escaped the observation of the government, and steps are being taken to efface it. Under the provisions of the current appropriation act for the department of agriculture authorizing the inauguration of experiments in the breeding of horses for military purposes an providing \$50,000 for that purpose, the secretary of agriculture, with the consent of the secretary of war, has appointed the following advisory agents in the selection of stallions and to assist in the operation of the government's plan: Henry Fairfax of Virginia, for thoroughbreds; C. L. Rainey of Kentucky, for American saddle horses; Walter Palmer of Illinois, for standard bred; Maxwell Everts of Vermont, for Morgans. Each agent acts with the officers of the government in the selection of horses of the breed he represents. The secretary of war has designated Lieutenant Colonel D. S. Stanley of the quartermaster corps to represent the army, and the secretary of agriculture has designated Geo. M. Rommell, chief of the animal husbandry division of the bureau of animal industry, to represent the Department of agriculture."

MEDFORD HAS A NEW CIVIC CLUB

EVER FRESH CLUB MAKES ITS MISSION THE INSPECTION OF CANNED FRUITS AND VEGETABLES IN THE MARKETS

MEDFORD, Jan. 14.—The "Ever Fresh" Club is Medford's latest civic improvement association, its object being the inspection of canned fruits and different foods that might be unhealthful to the general public. The club consists of several of Medford's business men, and those who are interested in the pure food laws.

The object of this club is to keep fresh fruit and vegetables on the market, especially in the line of canned goods. Vegetables, such as corn, beans, etc., are often dried and stored away for a long time, and then placed in cans. The vegetables are restored to freshness after they absorb moisture, but this is unknown to the public, and the goods are placed on the market to be sold to thousands of families, and endangering the lives of many.
