cides to set down a detailed account
of the adventures encountered while
dodging the detectives and process
servers who sought to invite him to at-
tend a meeting of the Pujo trust in-
vestigating committee, an interesting
narrative will be added to the litera-
ture of the day. For six months the
agile financier eluded the pack in a
hare and hounds chase that was
unique in its many puzzling phases.
At first it was considered only com-
mon courtesy to invite Mr. Rockefeller
to be the guest of the Pujo com-

mittee, but when it was found to be
so difficult to deliver the papers to
the famous copper man, the commit-
tee became insistent. The best sleuth-
ing talent in the country was engaged,
and with Sergeant at arms Charles R.
Riddell of the house of representa-
tives in command, the band of search-
ers went to work in earnest. Finally
an attorney representing Mr. Rocke-
feller accepted the service for his client.

IRRIGATIONISTS MOVE TO SALEM

DETERMINED APPEALS TO BE
MADE BEFORE LEGISLATURE
FOR THE ELIMINATION OF
SPECULATION

PORTLAND, Jan. 15.—The irri-
gation congress has moved from Port-
land to the legislature. In a special
car the delegates went to plead with
the lawmakers for laws that will
eliminate the speculation from recla-
mation and result in the sale of irri-
gated lands to actual settlers at its
present value, plus only the bare cost
of furnishing the water.

They will ask of the legislature ap-
propriations to finance defunct Carey
act projects and such change in the
irrigation laws as will forbid the pro-
motion and speculation costs that are
to be the chief cause of the Carey
act's failure in Oregon.
With a view to securing the co-op-
erative and harmonized efforts be-
tween government and state an ap-
propriation of \$50,000 will be asked to
be spent under the direction of the
state engineer, together with a like
appropriation from the government in
ascertaining the feasibility of one or
more large projects, covering valu-
able lands, but not reached by private
capital. The repaying of public mon-
ey is expected by a provision requir-
ing private capital availing such in-
formation to pay for it.

The chief purpose of the irrigation
congress delegates in appearing be-
fore the legislature is to aid in open-
ing Oregon to development by estab-
lishing a policy that gives more heed
to getting people on the land and at
work than of taking from them in the
beginning all their savings as first
payments.

If necessary, it was said, a reclama-
tion lobby will remain at the legisla-
ture during its entire session, and not
let up until requests have been grant-
ed.

PELICAN PICTURE A SPLENDID FILM

"MOVIES" SHOWING PELICANS ON
FLOATING ISLANDS IN LOWER
LAKE IS FAITHFUL PORTRAY-
AL, MAY LOCAL PEOPLE

Last night's program at the Temple
Theater was of unusual interest to
Klamath Falls people, for in addition
to the "class A" photoplays always
shown there, a motion picture of bird
life in the Lower Klamath Lake bird
preserve was shown. This was a por-
tion of an interesting film, "Here and
There in Oregon."

The big ungainly white pelicans
were the birds most in evidence, and
in addition to near views of the birds,
with their awkward efforts preparatory
to flight, the nests, eggs and the
young pelicans were shown.

The picture was made last summer
by Ray Earl, western camera man for
the Pathe company, who was assisted
by John V. Houston, manager of the
Temple theater. The picture is re-
markably clear, and all the features
are remarkably distinct.

The program will be repeated to-
night.

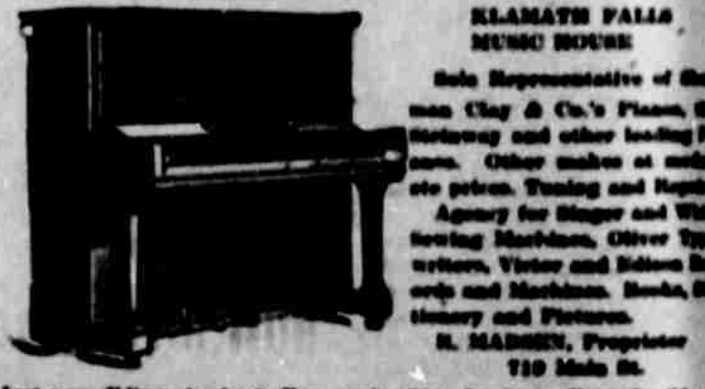
