## DECISION BAD FOR DAIRYMAN

LEGALIZING OF IMPORTATION AND DOCTERING OF EASTERN TUB BUTTER, SOLD AS OREGON PRODUCT, IS DETRIMENTAL

PORTLAND, Jan. 15.—The supreme court's decision that it is unconstitutional to prosecute the creamery man who brings butter from Wisconsin in a tub here to be sold under a dainty wrapper as "made in Oregon," clears the way for sending \$7,000,000 of Oregon money annually away, and continues the opportunity to deceive the people, according to the biennial report of the Oregon dairy and food commissioner, J. W. Bailey, now succeeded by J. D. Mickie. It is predicted that if the practice continues the dairy industry of Oregon will be destroyed, because Oregon dairymen cannot compete with the cheap tub butter, renovated after it reaches Portland, and sold at the high market rate.

This, in its turn, it is stated, will paralyze the development of Oregon, because men will not attempt to operate dairies and subdivisions to make a loss at it because of unfair competition.

## ELECTROCUTION INSTEAD OF ROPE

SPEAKER McARTHUR'S BILL MAY ABOLISH THE SCAFFOLD AS A MEANS OF CAPITAL PUNISHMENT IN OREGON

SALEM, Jan. 15.—To substitute electrocution for hanging is proposed in a bill introduced by Speaker McArthur of the house. Witnesses to an execution are to be limited.

In addition to the deputy there are to be three physicians and a jury of twelve reputable citizens, all to be summoned by the warden and such peace officers and electricians as may be needed to execute the judgment.

## LINK SAYS BUD'S CHANCES BRIGHT

Tom McCarey says the Anderson-Trott match would be interesting. He does not believe that one of the "Big Four" would consent to a meeting with Anderson right off the reel, but if he defeated Trott, would be in line to meet the big ones. Anderson is known among the critics, but the fight fans have not heard much about him. He is the boy George Memic thought was easy pickings. A number of "ace in the hole" sports took Memic to Medford from Los Angeles, believing that they would clean up when Memic defeated Anderson. But to their surprise Anderson proved a wonder, and Memic was beaten. They dropped \$2,500.

George Memic is a booster for Anderson. George went up north a few weeks ago, and Anderson handed him the crusher in the eighth round.

"Never was hit so hard in my life," said Memic, "and I've taken a few on the chin that would stop a freight engine. Anderson slid a right over on me and I thought a beam from the roof had fallen on me. Give this kid a show and he'll clean out the lightweight division."

Tom McCarey thinks well of Anderson, who has won forty-six out of forty-seven fights. Cap Melton also speaks highly of Anderson (saying he believes the Northwestern scrapper can whip any lightweight in the running now).
