NEW OFFICERS NOT TO QUALIFY

ternoon that this is only a remote possibility.

While the financial condition of the organization is given as one of the reasons for the probable failure of the Chamber of Commerce, the attempt of the morning newspaper to dictate the policy right at the start will probably influence most of the recently elected officers in their determination to have nothing whatever to do with it.

It is claimed that the proposed "re-organization" of the Chamber of Commerce is nothing more nor less than a well planned attempt to saddle a surplus of debts on some innocent residents. It appears that the Chamber

is in debt about \$2,100, to say nothing of a \$1,400 debt incurred indirectly by the directors of the Chamber, and which is secured by the individual notes of the directors.

The morning paper charges the Johnson brothers with mismanagement. Neither one of the Johnson brothers is in the city at the present time, and there is no way of ascertaining whether or not they have been responsible for the financial affairs of the local booster organization. However, the mere fact that the morning paper made the accusation would tend to acquit the Johnsons of this, especially as the true status of affairs was studiously repressed by the Northwestern.

The efforts of the morning paper to perfect the re-organization of the Chamber was one of the reasons for the careful investigation of the affairs of the institution. The disclosures following this probe made clear the reasons for advancing the re-organization plan. It was after this investigation that the newly elected officers declined to serve.

There have been several plans for re-organization suggested, but the only one that seems possible at this time is the making good of the debts of about \$3,500 previous to any new officers qualifying.

It has been suggested that the Northwestern make good these debts. It is argued that as the Northwestern is losing about \$600 per month it is suspended for several months and the money thus saved be used toward the paying off of the debt which the paper appeared to be so anxious to "saddle" onto Mr. Graves, Mr. Hall and their associates.

The fact that the paper would never be missed is also mentioned incidentally.
