INDIAN'S TRIAL FEBRUARY 2nd

CHENOWETH UMPQUA MUST
FACE JURY ON CHARGE OF
KILLING FRANK JACK, KLAM-
ATH INDIAN

The trial of Chenoweth Umpqua,
the Rogue River Indian charged with
the murder of Frank Jack, will be
set for February 2d. It was original-
ly set for Tuesday, but a continuance
is desired by District Attorney Irwin.
Jack was shot at Fort Klamath, a
few yards from the Wood River
bridge, on the "white" side of the
stream that divides Fort Klamath
from the Klamath Reservation. On
his death bed Jack accused Umpqua
of shooting him.
