Williams. Williams then wrote to
Home Secretary McKenna, "I want
to marry my girl, Florence. Will you
give me permission?" The curt re-
ply came back, "I am unable to ac-
cede to your wish."

WHEAT IS BEING SENT OUT BY DEPUTY STATE GAME WARDEN RAMSBY — CHINESE PHRANTS COME IN FOR FEED

Deputy State Game Warden Rams-
by announced today that work of
feeding the quail in this section is
progressing favorably. He has en-
tered into communication with farm-
ers residing in the sections where it
is known that there are quail, and
has notified them that he will pro-
vide wheat for the birds.

At Pelican Bay J. W. Lust has been
provided with a quantity of feed by
the state, and he is feeding the birds
daily. In Langell Valley the farmers
are feeding the birds, and feed will
be sent to them by the state. Birds in
the vicinity of this city are also being
fed at the expense of the state.

A message from the Rex Bord
ranch at Olene Monday says that the
Chinese pheasant recently turned
loose in that section by the state have
appeared there for feed.

are fleeing.

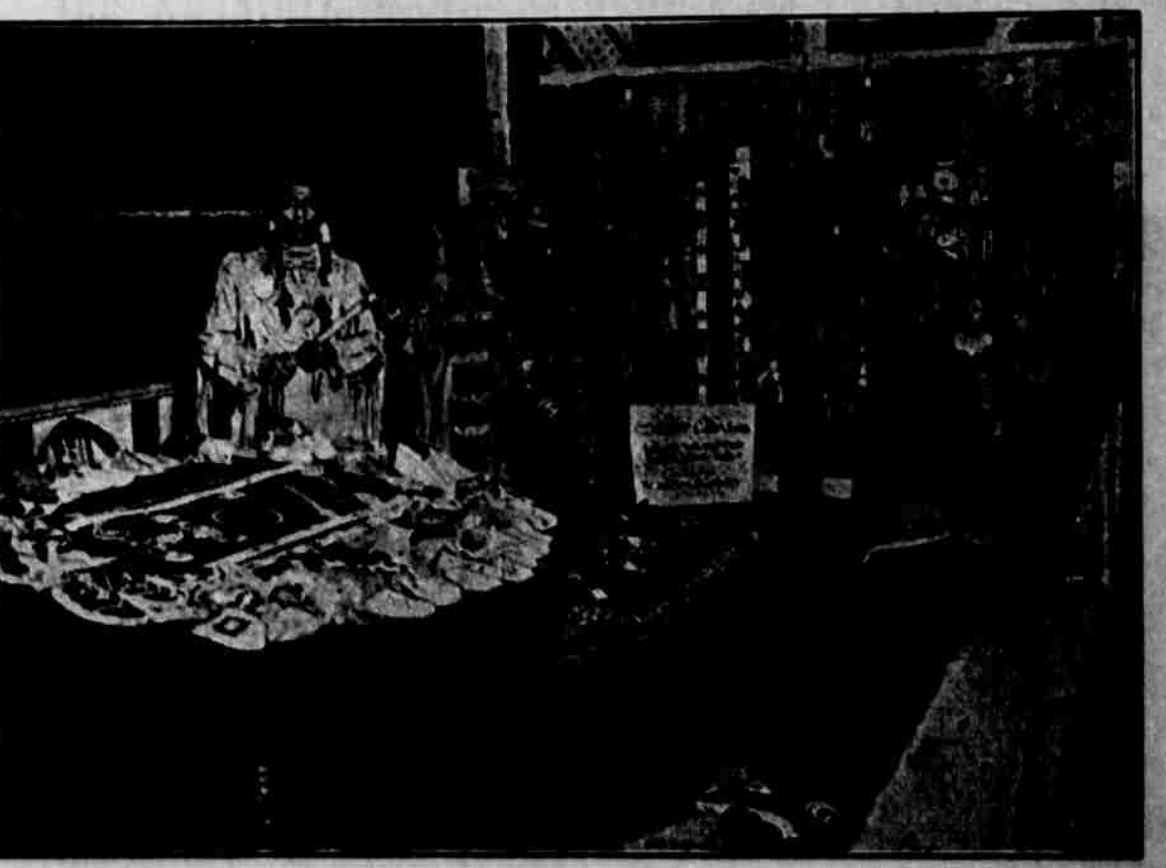
The crater is vomiting forth quan-
