RESOLUTIONS GO UP TO THE LEGISLATURE

SWEEPING CHANGES ASKED BY IRRIGATIONISTS

Policy of the Irrigation Congress is to encourage everything that will tend to develop the neglected districts of the state, and to make the irrigation of land kinder for the farmer.

The Klamath Water Users Association is in receipt of a copy of the resolutions adopted by the Oregon Irrigation Congress, recently held at Portland. Most of these are to be handed in the legislature by the irrigation committee, and this committee is believed to be in favor of a joint memorial to congress, asking for an extension of time on payments under the government projects.

A digest of some of the recommendations follow: Amendment of district irrigation law to provide that assessment levied annually to meet maintenance expense be collected at the same time and in the same manner as county taxes.

Legislature to appropriate \$50,000 to be used under supervision of state engineer as state's share of expense of investigating with the government the possibilities of irrigation and power projects in the state.

Amendment of state water law, changing the indebtedness limit of an irrigation district from \$5,000 to \$1 per acre for all the land included in the district.

No irrigation project be opened for settlement until water is ready for distribution.

Changes in the water laws of the state and careful attention to the recommendations of the state engineer.

Endorsement of the appropriation of additional funds for carrying on the adjudication of water rights by the board of control.

Adjudication of water to lands reclaimed and sold under the Central Oregon Irrigation project, and requirement for all land holders under project to clear and cultivate their lands and put the water to a beneficial use, thus helping to develop the section.

Remitting settler as well as irrigation company under Carey act project by the desert land board requiring issuance of a deed to the settler when settlement and reclamation are completed, and requiring settler to give first mortgage to the company.

Rumor Has it That Guy Merrill Will Quit His Job

Member of County Court is Said to be Disturbed Over the Charges Made by the Klamath County Grand Jury in Report Recently Made

A persistent rumor was current on the streets this afternoon that Guy Merrill would tender his resignation in a few days as county commissioner. The report could not be confirmed, as Mr. Merrill started for his home in Merrill this morning, and it was impossible to talk with him by telephone. Judge Worden of the county court declined to discuss the report this afternoon. He admitted that he had heard something of the rumor, but insisted that only Mr. Merrill was in a position to deny or confirm it.

Persons who are in close touch with conditions in the county are inclined to credit the rumor of Mr. Merrill's retirement from public life. In its recent report, the grand jury particularly attached Mr. Merrill's official acts, and it is reported that this was his principal reason for deciding to leave the employ of the county.

Mr. Merrill was in the city Tuesday and was in consultation with a number of his friends. This morning he left to return home, but it was stated that he would return in a few days, when he would formally present his resignation.
