CHICAGO WORKERS GIVE OUT EDICT

IF WINDY CITY FACTORIES TAKE WORK FROM NEW YORK CONCERNS, GARMENT WORKERS WILL WALK OUT

CHICAGO, Jan. 22.—Representatives of the local Garment Workers' Union have advised the manufacturers that they will strike if the local firms contract work from the New York shops during the strike in Gotham.
The Chicago garment workers number 30,000. They will walk out within a week if their demand is not respected, they declare.

HEAVY TURKISH LOSS REPORTED

FOURTY KILLED, 170 INJURED AND THREE CRUISERS DAMAGED IN SATURDAY'S NAVAL ENGAGEMENT

CONSTANTINOPLE, Jan. 22.—It is semi-officially stated here that the Turkish government lost forty men in Saturday's naval engagement, the list of wounded is placed at 170.
Three Turkish battleships were badly injured during the fight.

Foot of Snow In Lava Beds—Sheep on Hay

Louis Gerber Says Grass in Favorite Winter Pasture has Been Covered for the Past Ten Days

"For the past ten days there has been snow in the Modoc lava beds, and at present the fall is a foot deep," said Louis Gerber, a well known stockman, after his return from the big winter pasture. "The sheep are all on hay at this time."
Mr. Gerber went to the lava beds with the intention of buying for the market, and he bought a number of mutton sheep from Sherlock & Co. "There are about 16,000 head of sheep in the lava beds," continued Gerber. "These include I. D. Applegate's flock, the sheep belonging to Sherlock & Co., Dan Malloy, and two other lots. The sheep are all in fine condition, as there is plenty of hay available, and there will be no loss."

FEMALE JURY UP TO WOMEN

IN CASE THEY DESIRE TO BE ALLOWED TO QUALIFY, THEY MUST NOTIFY MEMBERS OF LEGISLATIVE COMMITTEE

SALEM, Jan. 22.—Whether or not the women of Oregon are to be made eligible to jury service is now a question for them to decide, so far as the house committee on revision of laws is concerned, for after considering at length a bill qualifying women for jury duty, its members have decided to defer action with relation to it until an expression can be had from the women as to whether they desire to be made eligible.
Should they fail to advise the committee as to their wishes on the subject, it is very probable that the committee will recommend that the bill be not enacted.
Should they, on the other hand, desire to qualify for jury service the committee is willing to recommend the passage of the bill making service either compulsory or optional. Representative Hottel of Marion county is chairman of the committee.

MONUMENT IS BEING OPPOSED

OPPOSITION TO LINCOLN MEMORIAL WOULD HAVE CONGRESS CHANGE PLAN TO ROAD FROM CAPITAL TO GETTYSBURG

WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 22.—Bitter opposition to the bill providing for the erection of a \$5,015,000 monument to the memory of Abraham Lincoln is threatened when the measure is taken up in the house today. The bill already has passed the senate. It provides for the erection of a statue and Greek temple on the Mall near the Washington monument, and its opponents are trying to substitute for it a plan to construct a memorial highway from Washington to Gettysburg.

OREGON SOLON WOULD DISPENSE WITH DISTRICT PROSECUTOR, SUBSTITUTING COUNTY ATTORNEYS

SALEM, Jan. 22.—Contending that under the district attorney plan, criminal litigation is congested and delayed, thereby causing persons arrested to remain in jails for many months before being given a trial, Representative Anderson of Clatsop county has introduced a bill providing for the abolishment of district attorneys and the substitution of county attorneys.
This bill is a companion to a bill to be introduced by Representative Latourette of Multnomah county, to provide that the jurisdictional area of circuit judges be confined to a single county, and providing for the abolishment of county judges and the handling of all probate work by circuit judges.
