GERMANS HIT AT NEW REMEDY

BERLIN, Jan. 22.—German scientists have outwitted Dr. Friedmann, who recently announced that he had discovered a cure for consumption, but who has not yet given the details of his discovery to the world.
Prof. Felix Klempner has secured from the arm of one of Dr. Friedmann's patients the living bacilli which Dr. Friedmann injected. The germ has been reproduced in large quantities, and scientists everywhere in Germany are experimenting with it.
"I am acting in the name of humanity," said Professor Klempner today. "If the germs are what Dr. Friedmann claims we will shortly give the truth to the world."
"I admit that the germ will help many, but I am not sure that it will help all."
