

Bud Anderson Puts Trott to the Bad in the Sixth Round and Referee Stops Proceedings

Ohio Boy is No Match for the Vancouver Lad

LOS ANGELES, Jan. 25.—Bud Anderson of Vancouver and Klamath Falls won over Sam Trott of Columbus, Ohio, in the sixth of a scheduled twenty-round battle this afternoon.

The fight was stopped in the sixth round after Anderson had beaten Trott all over the ring.

Anderson dropped Trott half a dozen times. The fight was fast and furious, but Trott had no chance from the first bell.

Referee Eyton stopped the mill after Trott had twice taken the count of nine in the sixth round.

Anderson was a 7-to-10 favorite in the betting. The weather was fine.

Jim Jeffries, Goodwin, Oldfield and Griffin were at the ringside. A big crowd of Medford sports was present.

HAWLEY URGES THAT BISHOP GET PATENT

CANDIDATE FOR SENATOR URGES THAT BISHOP GET PATENT

Fight for Homestead in Crater National Forest is Up in Washington Again—Congressman Urges That Bishop, White Chief Forester Groves Still Oppose Senator's Contentions

"This matter has been recommended by various Oregon legislators before this, and this is the second recommendation made by Hawley," says Senator H. L. Eriksen of the Crater National Forest, who is here from Medford.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 25.—Secretary of Agriculture Wilson told Representative Hawley last year when the Oregon man urged the secretary to order a patent granted to E. St. George Bishop on his homestead in the Crater National Forest, to go and see the place himself, and if he then would recommend the issuance of a patent the secretary would order it issued.

Hawley visited the place last summer, and this week he called on Secretary Wilson, explained the conditions, and expressed the opinion that it would be unwise to allow the forest service to take Bishop's claim for use as a ranger station, even though complete may be permitted to use it free, as it is said to be the plan of the forest service. Chief Forester Groves was present and opposed Hawley.

The fight between Bishop and the forestry service has been in progress ever since 1904, when Bishop, together with others, settled on land on Crystal Creek at the upper end of Upper Klamath Lake. The matter has been in the courts several times. The tract where Bishop has been

CREATE ANOTHER CITY PRECINCT

PORTION OF THE THIRD WARD WILL BE TAKEN TO FORM THE FOURTH WARD PRECINCT—A NEW PRECINCT NEAR MERRILL

SULTAN NOT HELD BY YOUNG TURKS IS LATE REPORT

MARITAL LAW IS IN FORCE IN CONSTANTINOPLE

Warships of the Powers Are Expected to Make Naval Demonstration in the Harbor of Constantinople. Resumption of War Is Not Expected—Powers Are Expected to Pledge Allies to Terms

United Press Service CONSTANTINOPLE, Jan. 25.—An earthquake occurred this morning. The superstitious Moslems are terrified.

Sherket has called the new assembly in session to formulate a new reply to the powers. It is regarded as certain that Turkey will refuse the Aegean Islands and Adrianople, but it is not believed that war will be resumed.

The Porte thinks that the powers will force the allies to moderate their demands.

Ever is enforcing martial law here. Street fighting has been checked. The report that the young Turks are in possession of the palace and have deposed the sultan is denied.

LONDON, Jan. 25.—Italian and British warships are speeding toward the Bosphorus as a result of the decision of the powers to make a naval demonstration before Constantinople. American, Russian and German warships are already in the harbor.

United Press Service LONDON, Jan. 25.—Tewfik Pasha, a Turk peace envoy, declared today that it was not likely that negotiations would be terminated. He said that he expected the deliberations to be resumed next week. Reuchid said that he had not received notice of removal from Constantinople. He declared that he did not expect to return there until peace had been concluded. These statements have encouraged the optimists.

United Press Service WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 25.—Ambassador Rockhill called today from Constantinople that the city is quiet and the indications are that the resumption of hostilities will not necessarily result from Kiamil's overthrow.
